NO CIVIL WAR SAYS PREMIER

Spanish Statesman Declares Majority of People Side With Crown—With Government, Cortes and Army It is Idle to Talk of Fight.

MADRID, Aug. 1.—In spite of alarming reports that the Carlist revolutionary movement is spreading in the Biscayan provinces of Spain, Premier Canajelas today announced that the talk of civil war raised by the clerical press is absurd.

"There is no question but that the majority of the Spanish people are with us," said the Premier. "With the government, the Cortes and the army on our side it is idle to talk of war."

Clerical newspapers today are demanding the dismissal of Canajelas and upbraiding Alfonso for falling under the baneful influence of corrupt and scheming advisors, and assert that unless the government shows an early desire to conciliate the Vatican the monarchy will be overthrown by the loyal Catholics of Spain.

It is officially announced that King Alfonso will continue his present course as outlined by Canajelas. Vigorous measures will be taken to prevent the publication of inflammatory newspaper attacks, which are expected to follow the government's action.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY FOLLOWS MOVING PICTURE MURDER

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 1.—Following an evening spent at a moving picture show, at which were displayed films depicting the tragic murder of a sleeping girl, Mrs. Margaret Eveland today shot and killed her husband while he slept. She then shot and killed herself.

The double tragedy came utterly without warning. The couple had been married for several years and had always been markedly happy. Within the last few months Mrs. Eveland has been a victim of nervousness. It is believed that the pictures which Mrs. Eveland saw last night may have inflamed her mind and suggested the killing.
