GANS NEAR DEATH'S DOOR AT CHICAGO HOME

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 4.—Joe Gans, the "old master," arrived here at noon on his way to Baltimore in his transcontinental race with death. The life of the once great fighter is close to the count, and it is doubtful if Gans will leave Chicago alive.

Gans was met at the Santa Fe depot by a delegation of friends, including his first wife, Mrs. Madge Gans. At her invitation Joe was carried on a stretcher to her home, where oxygen is being administered to him in the hope of keeping him alive. Considerable pathetic rivalry is manifested between the first wife of the dying man and his present mate. Each is vying with the other to supply comfort to the sinking patient.

not reveal at present the identity of persons who would have sought the death of the Kendalls.

"The bones of three persons very easily could have been incinerated in the stove. The flesh could have been fed to the hogs on the ranch. I am not saying that this actually was done, but the murderer could not have burned both flesh and bones in the stove.

"The attempt to destroy the bones shows that the murderer subjected them to the fiercest heat. The fragments are very small and calcined by the hot fire.

Done Outside House.

"The murders were done outside the house. We have reason to believe that one of the Kendalls was struck with a heavy stone and that two, and possibly all, were stabbed.

The theory is that the younger Kendall was struck down from behind, while his feeble father and mother were butchered afterward."

The all-night vigil of Sheriff Smith and a deputy at the ranch house was not rewarded. The clew that the murder was committed by a Japanese resulted today in a general alarm to the officials of the bay counties to seek out a certain Japanese answering descriptions given by neighbors of the Kendalls.

Last night additional bones were found, and these will be brought to Santa Rosa this afternoon to join the gruesome relics at the coroner's office.
