The king and queen of Spain came ashore last night. A high tide and strong wind caused a collision of tenders on which they were being taken ashore. For a time there was considerable excitement, but no one was injured.

PORTUGAL TO FOLLOW SPAIN.

Indications Are That Portuguese Will Separate Church and State.

ROME, Aug. 5.—The rejection by Pope Pius of two nominations to fill the post of the late Senor Antos, ambassador to the vatican, by Portugal is believed here to foreshadow a severing of diplomatic relations between the holy see and the Portuguese court.

That Portugal is preparing to follow the lead of Spain in attempting to separate church and state was shown recently when a Portuguese newspaper, the Voice of St. Anthony, adopted a tone that displeased his holiness, who ordered Cardinal Del Val to direct the bishop of Braga to suspend publication of the periodical.

The Portuguese government promptly issued a royal decree censuring the whole proceeding, on the ground that the vatican had infringed upon the royal prerogative by failing to submit the papal order to the king for his approval.

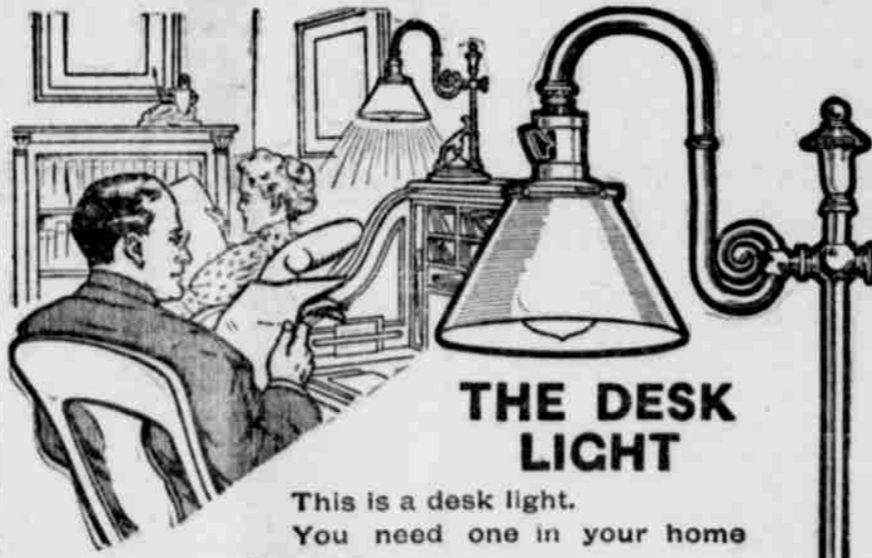
