MAKES FIRE MAN OUT OF HIMSELF

Ashland Man Overcome by Combination of Beverages, Rushes to Aid of Local Fire Department With Garden Hose.

About 10 o'clock Wednesday night E. W. Scott, who is employed as a drayman in Ashland, created a sensation on Front street by suddenly appearing with a length of some 25 feet of garden hose trailing behind him, shouting "Fire!" at every step, with the nozzle of the hose pointed toward the clouds. Officer Memsic asked him where he was going. "Going to that fire; they gave me this hose and told me to help put out the fire."

Realizing the man's condition, Memsic stood in with him, took up one end of the hose and guided his charge to the jail door. There the fire idea seemed to leave him entirely and he bolted through the alley at a pace that would make some of the record sprinters look foolish. He was caught, however, and after a night in jail could not recollect where he had found the hose or any of the attendant circumstances. "I must have been drunk," was his only solution of the problem. He was allowed to go on promise of remitting his \$5 fine as soon as he reached Ashland.
