MUST OPPOSE COOLIE LABOR

Union Labor Party in California to
Vote Against All Candidates Not
Pledged Against Asiatic Immigra-
tion and Land Ownership.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 12.—No political candidate in California may hope for a single vote from the union labor party unless he pledges himself publicly to fight for anti-Asiatic immigration and anti-land ownership by Asiatics. Members of the Asiatic exclusion league, a branch of the union labor party, are now at work on announced and prospective candidates to line them up for a renewal of the fight at the next session of the California assembly to make more rigid the exclusion of Asiatics.

Union labor in California is determined to push the exclusion fight harder this year than ever and not to submit to a checkmate by the federal authorities, as was the case two years ago, when Colonel Roosevelt, then president, took a hand in the agitation and succeeded in putting a stop to the drastic legislation that was proposed.

The exclusion league is incensed over the report of John D. MacKenzie, state labor commissioner, which makes it appear that Japanese and other oriental labor is necessary for the proper development of California's resources. The league charges MacKenzie with employing Japanese to secure much of the data in his report which will be presented to the legislature during the winter session. The report it is charged, in the interest of the railroads which are employing a large number of cheap laborers. It is practically certain that there will be a revival of the diplomatic war with Japan. But leaders declare that such talk will not have any deterring effect this time.

RICKARD QUILTS FIGHTING GAME

Promoter of Reno Farce Through
With Ring Forever—Going Into
Coal Mining at Coos Bay—Jeff
Also Out of Squared Circle.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—Tex Rickard, mining man and erstwhile promoter of the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Reno, is through with the fight game forever. He gives no reason for and weeps no tears over his decision. Rickard intimates that there is no more money in it, and that the coal mining business near Coos Bay, Oregon, offers better opportunities for making money. Rickard states that he has an option on several hundred acres of valuable coal land in southwestern Oregon. He will go there to once.

Rickard also takes occasion to reiterate the oft-heard assertion that Jim Jeffries makes that he, too, is out of the squared circle.

"Jeffries has a stout bank roll," said Rickard today, "that will keep him busy spending it. He is out of the game for good."

KEENE FAVORS BALLINGER PLAN

Republican State Central Committee-
man Named by Acting Governor as
Oregon Representative at National
Conservation Congress at St. Paul

Dr. J. M. Keene, member of the republican state central committee from Jackson county, has received an appointment from Acting Governor Jay Bowerman as delegate from Oregon to the national conservation congress to be held at St. Paul September 5.

Dr. Keene's view on conservation are well known. He opposes the withdrawal of lands that could be utilized by settlers as delaying the development of the state, and is a strong advocate of the Ballinger brand of conservation as against that of Pinchot.

Dr. Keene will probably attend the congress. Mrs. Keene will accompany him, and they will visit Yellowstone Park en route.

ASHLAND STREET PAVING BEGINS

Warren Construction Company Starts
Work in Earnest—Teams and
Grading Outfit Arrive—Electricity
at Rock-Crushing Plant.

It begins to look like business along paving lines, says the Tidings. Today 34 horses and mules have arrived on the scene, preliminary to the institution of active operations in the way of grading, while the full equipment of wagons graders, scrapers, etc., are expected on every train.

W. M. Church will superintend the work here for the Warren Construction company, and is already located in office room 7 in the Ashland Improvement club headquarters. He expects an assistant in the way of a timekeeper, stenographer and cashier combined at an early date, when the official family will be complete ready to take up the big work before them.

From the fact that City Engineer Dann and assistants are driving preliminary stakes out in the Boulevard section, it is guessed that this par-

ticular locality will witness the beginning of bitulthic improvements this season.

The construction people are going to utilize electricity for power at the rock crushing plant, and those premises are now being overhauled with a view of increasing the capacity in order that there may be no delay due to lack of material.

The scope of territory to be paved embraces several miles in extent, at an approximate cost of \$140,000, and it seems a relief, after weeks of delay, to be assured that something will be doing at an early day.
