ANTI-ASSEMBLY CLUB FORMED

Gold Hill Is First Place in Oregon to Organize Club With Which to Defend the Direct Primary and Statement One.

The first organized opposition to the assembly scheme in Oregon was developed in Gold Hill Wednesday night, when the Gold Hill Anti-Assembly club was organized by adherents of several political faiths. Republicans and democrats predominating. Its purpose is to combat the work of the recent republican and democratic assemblies, which its members regard as wolves in sheep's clothing, attempting to circumvent the direct primary and render Statement No. 1 inoperative by getting candidates of both tickets who have not pledged themselves, to abide by it.

The following are the officers of the club: President, Riley Hammersley, republican; vice-president, W. P. Chisholm, democrat; secretary, Rex H. Lampman, independent; treasurer, J. B. Hammersley, republican; executive committee, the president, with A. J. Smith and Lon Applegate, republicans.

Statement of Purpose.

The following statement of purpose was drafted by the secretary and enthusiastically adopted by the club:

"We, the qualified electors of the voting precinct of Gold Hill, irrespective of political affiliations, believe in the efficacy of the direct primary and Statement No. 1 for giving the people what they want. We recognize in the recent assemblies, both republican and democratic, attempts to circumvent the direct primary and knock out Statement No. 1.

"As such, we condemn all assemblies and urge a repudiation of their work by a defeat of their tickets from top to bottom at the polls on September 5. We will support no assembly candidate of whatever political party, believing that the people of Oregon are competent to select candidates for any and all offices within their gift."

For the Man, Regardless.

President Hammersley in his speech of acceptance, said that while he was a firm believer in the principles of republicanism, he would not hesitate to vote for a democrat or a socialist if he was convinced that he would make a better public servant than his republican opponent. The assembly he regarded as a vicious attempt to restore the rotten convention system and make the primary merely a ratification of the work of the assembly.

"Let the People Rule."

"Anything to beat Bourne," appears to be the war cry of the assemblyites," declared the speaker, "and they hope to do it by getting men in the legislature who are not pledged to Statement No. 1. It should be part of the purpose of our organization to see that all legislative candidates, of whatever party,

are pledged to Statement No. 1, so that, whatever the political complexion of the legislature, the people will get what they want in the matter of election of United States senators. If men can be gotten into the legislature at the next session who are not Statement No. 1 supporters, they will do their best to make good records so that they can be re-elected without the statement pledge and accomplish Bourne's defeat when he comes up for re-election. The people should have whomsoever they want for United States senator, whether Bourne or not, and the only way that they can enforce their wishes is to refuse to vote for all legislative candidates who refuse to subscribe to Statement No. 1."

STORK'S VISIT TO FRISCO BECOMING VERY INFREQUENT
