Only one candidate for the legislature, F. W. Mears, an insurgent republican, a comparatively newcomer, has announced his candidacy. Others talked of his candidates are Joe Hammersley of Gold Hill, Geo. Herriman, Horace Nickelson, J. E. Watt, and S. A. Nye of Medford, Wm. Under Hellen of Eagle Point, C. H. Gillette and Judge C. B. Watson of Cabland and J. W. Merritt of Central Point. On the democratic side, Hor-

ace Pelton of Sawes valley, Clarence Reames, W. E. Phipps, C. W. F. Rau are among the discussed.

Judge F. M. Calkins, the assembly nominee for circuit judge has no opposition thus far, but democrats are urging State Senator H. D. Norton

of Grants Pass to make the race against him. Mr. Norton has not yet given his assent.

The most important office, from a citizens point of view to be filled this year, is that of county commissioner. The automobilists have en-

dorsed W. H. Brown of Medford, who seems to be the choice of business men and citizens generally. He is a good roads advocate and a shrewd business man. Mr. Brown is loth to make the sacrifice of time involved, but as sacrifices are necessary on the

part of good citizenship, he may be induced to become a candidate. Others mentioned for the place are J. E. Enyart, A. C. Allen, and Berton Bowers. Democrats talk of Col. F. L. Ion Velle. None of these have consented to the use of their names.

Republicans who have filed petitions for county office include John Bellinger for sheriff, W. R. Coleman for clerk, Fred Colvig for recorder and James Cronemiller for county treasurer. Sheriff Wilbur Jones will be the democratic nominee to succeed

himself and John Summerville is talked of as democratic candidate for county clerk.

A. E. Reames has been nominated by the Klu Klux Klan as democratic candidate for attorney general, but is hearing up bravely under it.
