FEW PEARS LEFT FOR F. O. B. TRADE

The following gives the number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week ending Friday morning, August 12, 1910: Peaches-254 1-2 cars. Shipments of this variety held up better than was expected during the past week, but there will be a heavy decline next week. Saliways will begin moving in a limited way in a few days, but there will be no shipments of consequence until the following week. About September 1 the heavy movement of Lvl Clings will begin. Plums-89 1-4 cars. Plum shipments are decreasing daily and will continue to do so during the remainder of the season. There are a few Grand Duke, Hungarian and Kelsey still available. Pears-226 1-4 cars. Last week's shipment shows a decline in this variety and this will be found to be greater during the next seven days. There are a very few pears now available for the f. o. b. trade. Grapes-223 1-4 cars. The grape movement is now fairly under way. Movement consists principally of Malagas and Thompson Seedless, but Tokays from the earlier sections are becoming fairly plentiful in the auction cars. It probably will be ten days to two weeks before we will have this variety to offer in quantity. Rose of Peru are just about ready to move and will be forwarded in a limited way during the coming week. The weather has remained fine and all conditions are favorable to the perfect development of fruit.

ROSEBURG PEARS SELL AT \$2.90 BOX

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 15.-Returns from the first carload of pears shipped from Douglas county for the season were received today. The check was for \$1740, representing 600 boxes at \$2.90 a box, delivered at the local depot. The pears were grown in the famous Bradburn orchards about eight miles southwest of the city, and were of the Bartlett variety. The fruitgrowers are elated over the success of Dr. Bradburn in disposing of his product.
