FIRST PRIMARIES IN CALIFORNIA

Heavy Vote is Expected Tomorrow
as Fierce Battle Has Been Waged
—Registration Has Been Unusually Heavy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—State leaders of both the democratic and republican parties expect a record vote tomorrow when the electors go

to the polls in the first state-wide primary in the history of California. With a registration that is the greatest in the history of the state, it is predicted that the vote will reach a total of nearly 400,000. Many factors combine to make the leaders believe that a heavy vote will be polled. The contest between the machine republicans and the insurgents, which has attracted national attention, is one factor; another is the fact that in almost every county there are a number of contests over county nominations. Another reason to expect a record vote is the canvass that the congressional candidates have made. County and congressional candidates are conceded by the politicians to poll the greatest

votes. In the congressional districts the fight has been close, with the exception of the third, fourth and sixth districts, where the republican incumbents are unopposed. In the fifth district, where William Kent, insurgent is making the race against William MacKinlay, republican stand-patter, the contest has been hot and the vote promises to be unusually heavy. Kent was aided in his canvass by Gifford Pinchot, former forester friend of Theodore Roosevelt, who made a week's tour of the district. Pinchot also addressed a big meeting in San Francisco in favor of Hiram W. Johnson, Lincoln-Roosevelt and insurgent candidate for governor. The principal test, so far as insur-

est in the state in general goes, is over the nomination for governor. Alden Anderson, regular and machine candidate; Charles F. Curry, regular, who is running on his own nomination; Philip Stanton, who made the campaign on the platform "the man who Roosevelt praised," and Nathaniel Ellery, regular, are the candidates besides Johnson. Theodore A. Bell is the only candidate for the democratic nomination for governor. The campaign has been spectacular. Automobiles have been used to tour the state as freely as though the candidates were merely swinging through the streets of a city ward. All sorts of advertising schemes have been adopted. The endorsement of a candidate

for United States senator is also creating interest. There are three candidates in the field, all republicans. They are E. A. Meserve, regular; A. G. Spaulding, the millionaire sporting goods manufacturer, and John D. Works, Lincoln-Roosevelt candidate. Spaulding is known as the business men's candidate. The socialists have a candidate for endorsement for senator, but his name is not printed on the ticket.
