FISHERMEN DEFEY HUME ESTATE

New Island on Rogue River Bar Aids
in Fight for Free Fishing—Report-
ed That Deal for Sale of Hume
Property Falls Through.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 16.—
The injunction suit brought by Her-
bert Hume in the name of the R. D.
Hume company to prevent the Union
Fisheries company from fishing in
the Rogue river has thus far had no
effect, for the Union Fisheries people
continue to fish. The men cannot
encroach on the Hume lands, which
practically surround the fishing wa-
ter, but they have found a way out
of it. At the mouth of the river, on
the bar, is an island which was formed
last winter. The fishermen have
taken up this island as headquarters
and continue to fish, bringing their
catch to Coos Bay for transportation
to Portland.

It is reported that the deal for the
purchase of the Hume estate by a
syndicate of Portland men has fallen
through. A sum of money was paid
as an option, but this option has run
out and the property was not taken
up. The estate consists of the fisher-
ies and canning plants and thou-
sands of acres of timber and range
land.

GAYNOR'S CONDITION IS SATISFACTORY

HOBOKEN, N. J., Aug. 16.—
"Mayor Gaynor's night was restful
and his condition is satisfactory,"
said the official bulletin issued at
8:30 this morning. "Respiration
practically normal."

the night and seemed stronger to-
