

To Want-Avertise is to be Business-Like--Because it Gets Results

FIRM DEMAND FOR FANCIES

Eastern Fruit Beginning to Ripen—Market Strong for First Grades but Weakens for Ordinary Kinds of Fruit Clapp's Favorites off Color

The New York Fruit Trade Journal comments as follows on the New York pear market, under date of August 13:

The pear market this week was firmer on strictly fancy, but weaker on ordinary kinds of fruit. Clapp's Favorites were in heavier supply, but most of the receipts, while desirable in size, were off color and sold for \$2.50 to \$3.00 per barrel. Fancy high-colored marks in standard packages readily commanded \$4.00 to \$4.25, but the same grade in short packages did not exceed \$3.50 to \$3.75 per barrel.

Reports from the Catskills stated that some of the largest orchards of Clapp's Favorites in that section have been contracted for at \$4.00 per barrel f. o. b. railroad, shippers' own pack and grade.

Bartlett's are commencing to arrive but the offerings so far are small and dark and show other defects incident to unfavorable dry weather. Only a very small proportion of the current receipts are bringing over \$4.00. A few lots of Jersey Bartlett's, very closely graded and large, went to special trade at \$4.25 to \$4.75 for standard packages, but the supply was very limited.

Seckels were more plentiful and sold freely at \$4.50 to \$5.00 per barrel, while those in flour barrels went at \$6.00. At the same time, some of that variety from up-river sections that were picked too green found a slow outlet at \$2.50 to \$3.00.

Southern Kieffer pears are arriving more freely, and while some sales are being reported up to \$3.00 per barrel, this is quite exceptional. About \$2.00 to \$2.50 is all that the average best lots can command.

Southern Le Conte pears showed a very wide range in quality. Many of those arriving by steamer were heated and soft, and sold as low as \$1.50 to \$2.00. Closely graded stock that came by rail sold up to \$4.00 to \$4.25. On the average run of Le Contes \$2.50 to \$3.00 was about the general selling price.

Bell pears are arriving very sparingly, but that variety is not in particular favor, and very few sales exceeded \$3.00, although, closely graded large would probably bring \$3.25 to \$3.50. On mixed varieties and cooking kinds the market ranged from \$2.00 to \$3.00. Everything sound brought the inside price.
