Bartletts—Advance continues. First lot today touched \$3; best \$2.75 to \$2.40 and virtually none below \$2.25. Much lighter arrivals expected for next week and a strong market seems certain. Bartletts will be fine property here before long.

Plums—Arrivals ample and almost all Grand Dukes, Giants, Hungarians, Kelseys and one or two other varieties. We open the season Monday morning next with first cars of Italians coming from Yakima and expect most satisfactory figures. Idaho expects a heavy crop, but will probably not commence them until those west of Idaho are all out of the way. We strongly advise shipments of Italians, Hungarians and Silvers.

Poaches—Market very strong. All best stock \$1.60 to \$1.50. Some fine Elbertas and some handsome Chigs were fought for today. Georgia absolutely ended and those from Delaware and Maryland are poor. Grapes—Few Tokays from Vacaville continue to arrive and sell mostly \$2.50 to \$3.00, while the Malagas sell around \$1.50. It looks well ahead on Tokays.

Weather—Very bad first three days, rainy, hot, sticky, but today beautiful, cool and bracing, so that street sales are immense.

MORE WATER FOR ASHLAND

Engineer Roberts Submits Plan for Increasing Water Supply Costing \$100,000, Ample for a Population of 25,000—Council Not Decided

Engineer W. J. Roberts who has had charge of the construction of Medford's new water system, has been employed to figure upon the cost of enlarging the Ashland water system. Ashland gets its water from a local creek and has now one of the finest supplies in the state, but the rapid growth of the city necessitates an enlargement of the present facilities.

Mr. Roberts has submitted a report to the Ashland city council giving figures upon a supply for a city of 25,000 population. His figures go into detail as to low-level and high-level reservoirs, distributing systems, zones of pressure, etc., together with estimates of 4,000,000 and 1,000,000 gallon capacity respectively, also a proposed overhauling of the entire water system in general and reconstruction of same on well-defined and enlarged lines. Cost of this notable improvement would be approximately preliminary work throughout from a number of localities in Oregon and neighboring states where he had undertaken this sort of work on an extensive scale. In addition to the communication, Mr. Roberts was present in person and addressed the council regarding the scope and other details of the enterprise. Matter was taken under advisement, pending the adjourned session which meets August 18th.

FOLDERS SHOW NEW FRISCO

Panama-Pacific Exposition Committee Issues Literature Descriptive of Gateway to Aid in Clearing Big Fair

The Exploitation and Publicity Department of the Panama-Pacific Exposition have issued a twelve-page folder on the proposed exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915. This folder is illustrated with panoramic views of the city, one taken just after the fire and the other taken recently, and two smaller views of the canyon of two streets in the "downtown district," showing the splendid modern appearance of the city. These folders will fit in a regulation business envelope and carry for request postage. It is planned to request business houses throughout the west to enclose these little booster folders in all their eastern correspondence. The following are excerpts from the folder.

No other city in the United States is so well situated, so fittingly located, as San Francisco, to celebrate the completion of the Panama Canal. In San Francisco's superb harbor the fleets of all nations may assemble, and merchant ships carry exhibits direct from home ports. The completion of the canal is distinctly a Pacific ocean event, since it opens the Pacific to the commerce of the world. The west has never held an international exposition. There have been four in the country: The first at Philadelphia, on the Atlantic seaboard, in 1876; the second, on the Mississippi, at New Orleans, in 1885; the third, in the Mississippi valley region, at Chicago, in 1893; the fourth at St. Louis, on the Mississippi, in 1904. All received large government aid. New Orleans received a loan of \$1,000,000 (which has never been repaid); subsequently \$300,000 was appropriated for a government exhibit, and later \$350,000 additional was appropriated to pay the debts of the exposition. New Orleans then was as much the center of population as it is today.

All California and the entire west is standing back of the proposed show—standing back with the same vigor and go that has ever been characteristic of the west. The west makes no failures.
