AUTO WRECKED IN RACE.

9:30 last night. The injured driver and his assistant were taken to the Coney Island hospital, where it was said that Owens would recover and that Williams undoubtedly was fatally injured.

The accident eliminated the Marston car from the race. The Matheson car dropped out last night for 11 minutes at the end of the 89th mile, when it skidded at a turn, crashed through a fence and slightly injured Driver Basle. The Stearns car at this juncture took the lead, which it retained when the race was half over at 8:30 this morning.

At that time the Stearns, with Patschke and Poole driving alternately, had completed 626 miles; the Matheson car, with Basle and Whale drivers, had covered 590; the Cole car, Endicott and Edwards, drivers, 540; Houpp-Rockewell, driven by Martin and Harmon, 436; Midland, Anderson and Taylor, drivers, 372.

The Stearns, with the race half over, was two miles ahead of the 1909 distance record.

they had failed to grow into large fires, so vigilant are the men fighting the flames.

Troops at Work
The first troops arrived in Butte Falls which is at the extreme northwest of the blazing forests, at 5 o'clock Friday and early Saturday left for the front. At Butte Falls they were met by rangers who directed their movements.

Supervisor Erickson now has 75 additional men battling with the flames on the slopes of Mt. McLoughlin, from where Medford derives its water supply. Here is found one of the finest bodies of sugar pine in the west today and these giant trees are fast being consumed until only tall charred trunks remain. The fate of Medford's water supply is in doubt. Should this be seriously impaired it will mean a great loss as the city has just completed a gravity system at a cost of \$500,000.

There is little hope of an early control of the flames now ones are constantly breaking out and a high wind is spreading them rapidly.


