FRUIT MARKET IS STILL STRONG

In Spite of Heavy Shipments, Prices for Coast Fruit Are Good--\$2.25 to \$2.75 for Bartletts in Markets in the East.

Forty cars of Rogue river pears passed Sacramento during the 48 hours ending August 23, and sales reported August 23 show that the prices are holding up. Prices range from \$2.25 to \$2.75, according to quality and state of the market where sales are made. Returns from the shipments of the Rogue River association are slow coming in. The fruit is being widely distributed, as the state of the market seems to demand, and the figuring up of results requires a lot of bookkeeping.

300 CARLOADS OF PEACHES GO EAST

Heaviest Week in Fruit Shipments in History of Yakima Valley--Over 300 Additional Men Needed to Harvest Crop.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 25.—Three hundred carloads of peaches are expected to be en route from North Yakima for the east by the close of this week, the biggest fruit-shipment week in the history of the Yakima valley. The Weber-Bussell cannery has started operations, and has been guaranteed 180 tons of peaches, but will probably handle a great many more than this amount. The secretary of the Fruitgrowers' Labor bureau announces that he will be able to find work for 300 men in the next week. Crawford peaches and prunes are almost through coming in. When they are all picked the field will be left clear for the Elberta peaches, which are the backbone of the Yakima valley crop. Elbertas will continue to come in for three or four weeks. Next week will be heavy, but this is expected to be the heaviest week of the season.

Findlay orchard of Wellen measuring 15 inches in circumference. One plate of Wealthy apples from A. Conroy orchard. One plate containing four of the largest apples grown in Rogue River valley. On the same plate will be found one of the smallest apples grown in the Rogue River valley. One plate of fine Bartletts from the 401 ranch. Two cantaloupes, one as large as a walnut and the other as large as a football; very fine specimens, grown by Brommer Bros., Medford. One plate of Bose from G. H. Daggett. A fine bunch of Tokay grapes weighing one pound and a half, not fully matured, but of good color, grown by A. H. Carson & Son, Grants Pass, Or.

All the best mountain Bartletts today sold at \$2.87 to \$3.12, and very little below \$2.30, although some yellow ripe sold \$2.30. One car from Roseburg, fine hard, green pears, \$2.66. Situation ahead is satisfactory. Peaches—Market better than it was earlier in the week. Some good Elbertas, \$1.10 to \$1.30. We see no chance for peaches to come here for quite awhile from Oregon or Washington. The newspaper report emanating from Spokane that Sgobel & Day had bought 100 cars of prunes from the Blalock Fruit company of Walla Walla is untrue. We have been their representatives here for years, but never buy for our account.
