

PLANTING FISH KLAMATH LAKES

O. A. Stearns and Others Make an Effort to Stock Beautiful Lakes in Klamath County, Where Trout Will Supply Fine Sport.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 27.—On the train which arrived last evening were three consignments of young fish which were sent here by the government fish hatchery at Clackamas, Or., and which are to be planted in the lakes west of the upper Klamath lake. Two of these consignments are of rainbow trout and the other is catfish fry.

Applications were made to the state hatchery recently by O. A. Stearns, W. E. Bowdoin and J. W. Siemens each for a consignment of these fry. Mr. Stearns will leave for Aspen Lake, where the catfish will be planted, this evening and will arrive at the lake some time during the night, so as to get the fry in the water as quickly as possible. The trout fry will be placed in the water in perforated cans so they can get fresh water and will remain there until morning, when they will be carried to some other lakes higher up in the hills.

Lakes Little Known.
These lakes are in old extinct volcanic craters on the top of hills between Aspen Lake and Lake of the Woods. There are four or five of these beautiful lakes and are known to but few people, and only those who happen there in search of big game such as bear and deer. These lakes cover a territory from five to ten acres and are ideal places for trout, as they are similar to Crater Lake, deep, clear and cold. Into two or three of the larger of these lakes Mr. Stearns and his assistants, Mr. Siemens and son and another man, will place the trout fry, where they will be allowed a chance to grow, multiply and stock these waters.

The placing of these fry in these lakes is no small undertaking, considering the distance they have to be hauled overland after they arrive here, the abruptness of the mountain climb on foot with them that has to be made and the particular care that must be taken to keep the fish alive in transit.

MILITARISTS GAIN GROUND IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Led by the Tory press of England, the British militarists rapidly are gaining ground in their "universal service" movement, which would render every man between the ages of 16 and 45 subject to at least a year's strict military training. A qualification of this rule would allow exemption in the payment of a certain tax for non-service. On account of this limitation the proposed measure has found advocacy among the "upper classes" as well as with the mass of workmen.

The German scare enabled the militarist press and the London Express in particular, to found their arguments for conscription on a popular basis. Already the movement has become an issue that will be thrashed out at the next general election. The substance of the scheme is to impress every male subject between 16 and 45 for a minimum service of one year and a maximum of five. For those who would evade such service a tax of considerable percent would be imposed, so that not too many might pay it, and the conscription idea thus be defeated.

MRS. FRENCH PUBLISHES LETTERS FROM HEINZE

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Letters opening with such tender terms as "My Dear Little Bob" and "My Dear Little Puss" were published Friday by Mrs. Lillian Hobart French, following her accusation against F. Augustus Heinze, the copper magnate, that he had jilted her after many years of affectionate relations.

Mrs. French alleges the missives she made public today were written to her by Heinze.

Some of the excerpts from the letters are couched in most endearing terms. Many of them are signed with names apparently of the pet variety. "Fog" occurs frequently and Mrs. French asserts that this is a contraction of "Aug." As another feature of her revenge she says she is preparing to file a suit for the recovery of \$25,000 worth of Silver King and Consolidated securities. These, she claims, were given her by the copper magnate and later given back to him during his financial embarrassment.

IDAHO IS LEADER IN IRRIGATION

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 27.—Dr. Samuel Fortier, chief of the irrigation investigation bureau of the department of agriculture, who is in the northwest inspecting the government projects in Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon, says in an interview that Idaho, California and Colorado are well in the lead in irrigation, adding:

"I believe that if the truth were known through compiled statistics Idaho is now in the lead of all western states as to the amount of land under completed projects. It was recently estimated that California has 3,500,000 acres under completed and projected projects, but I am inclined to believe that Idaho has, at the present time, a still larger area. It is quite generally recognized that our agents are well posted on irrigation conditions, and the officials of the census bureau have agreed to collect valuable information for our office, providing that we supervise the work of the two branches in this line."

Ship Turns Turtle.
 BREMEN, Germany, Aug. 27.—News that the steamer Harvest Queen turned turtle in midocean was brought to port today by the liner Koenigstein Louise. All the passengers and members of the crew are safe, having been picked up off the Azores by the Louise, which landed them here today.
