ers, 50 are clowns, which indicates that hilarious merriment will be an agreeable element in the varied program. A feature of the ring performance will be the new thriller, entitled, "Jupiter, the balloon horse." This wonderfully trained equine stands without fastening upon a platform attached to a balloon, and is carried to the topmost part of the canvas, where, amid a shower of fireworks, he stands immovable. An infant giraffe, the first to be born in captivity, is an interesting feature of the zoological collection.

Among the arenic artists the principals are Winston's trained seals, performing difficult feats of juggling while mounted upon the backs of swiftly flying horses; Charley the First, the famous equestrian chimpanzee; the Adonis Twins, in their human pennant acrobatic novelty; the Konyots in a delightfully entertaining exhibition of equestrianism; Orrin and Victoria Davenport, champion equestrians of two hemispheres; Miss Julia Shipp with her splendidly disciplined high-school horses, illustrating the highest type of fancy riding; Fred Derrick, champion bar-back somersault rider; the Florence troupe of old-world acrobats in a new posing specialty; the Flying Neapolitans in their pleasing aerial flights; the Dollar troupe, presenting a new interpretation of the famous Risleys act; the ten Viennese, a group of aerial artists who are said to rival the birds in their flights from perch to perch, high up in the canvas dome; Nettie Carroll, in a "pink tea" entertainment, while balancing on a golden wire; the beautiful Seresto Sisters in a triple trapeze exploit; the Four Passios, European equilibrist and wonderful stairway performers; the elephant brass band and Desperado's sensational dive from the topmost dome of the tent, landing upon a platform and striking same with his chest.

Barnum & Bailey greatest show on earth will give one performance here, Monday morning at 10 o'clock. There will be a free street parade during the morning. Many entertainments are promised. Five great

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—A dull market and falling prices characterized the last day of the week on the stock exchange. Baltimore & Ohio, Brooklyn Rapid Transit, St. Paul, Consolidated Gas, New York Central, Northern Pacific, Pennsylvania and Southern Pacific dropped fractions. Trading was dull and only two leaders advanced as much as a point, American Beet Sugar 2 1/2 and Chicago Great Western, the latter rising on the strength of a rumor that the road would be purchased by the Northern Pacific. The market closed heavy.
