REVOLUTION MAY BREAK IN KOREA

Reported That Company of Koreans Plan to Leave for Home Country to Head Revolutionary Movement Against Japanese Masters.

HONOLULU Aug. 30.—A company of 400 Koreans, armed and equipped for service in Cho-Sen, the newly acquired Japanese name for their ancient country, are preparing to leave for the orient to head a revolutionary movement against Japan, according to reports in a paper here. These reports indicate that the men have been drilled and the pick of 4000 Koreans in the islands, all of whom belong to an anti-Japanese society, organized for the purpose of resisting Japanese rule in Korea. It is stated that already several Korean leaders have arrived in the orient from Hawaii and that they are prepared to lead their countrymen against their Japanese masters.

SAN FRANCISCO HAS A MATCHLESS CLAIM

"Four million dollars subscribed to the Panama Pacific fund in two hours!"

"Seven and a half million dollars already subscribed!"

"Ten million more to be secured at the special session of the legislature called by the governor for this purpose!"

3 DEAD, 4 INJURED IN DAKOTA TORNADO

JAMESTOWN, N. D., Aug. 30.—A tornado that demolished the village of Heaton last night left in its wake today three deaths and four injured persons. The storm was so violent that freight cars were blown 200 feet from the depot and wrecked.

Relief trains are on the way from here, but the report is that the tracks were destroyed when a large elevator was blown down on the railway right of way.

ATTEMPT MADE TO LYNCH TWO MEN

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 30.—Militiamen and sheriff's deputies today are guarding the county jail, following an attempt last night to lynch John Wayne and Charles Claybourne. The blacks are alleged to have committed a brutal murder.

Feeling against the prisoners and the negro population generally is so bitter that a race war is feared. It is probable that martial law will be declared. Several men involved in the attack on the jail are under arrest.

A special grand jury has been called and is investigating the outbreak.

SAYS CREDIT SHOULD GO TO INSURGENTS

M'COOK, Neb., Aug. 30.—Admitting that President Taft's campaign letter is an able document, Congressman Norris, leader of the insurgents in the house, declared the progressives were really responsible for most of the legislation about which the president talked.

"Taft's campaign statement is an able document," said Norris, "but it should be remembered that to the despised insurgents of the house and senate is due the credit for all the progressive legislation of the last congress. The people should remember that the Cannon-Aldrich machine is doing all it possibly can to oppose this same legislation."
