ROOSEVELT WITH JOHN BROWN

It is evident that the middle western insurgents expect Roosevelt to lead them.

It was decided last night that Garfield and Pinchot should leave the train at Kansas City and go to Wisconsin to help Senator La Follette in his fight for re-election. It also was decided that Roosevelt's speech at Milwaukee should contain an endorsement of La Follette.

At Ottawa, Governor Stubbs introduced Roosevelt as "the greatest man not only in Kansas and the United States, but in the world."

In his speech, Colonel Roosevelt said:

"I have a peculiar association with Kansas. It was the Kansas delegation to the republican national convention at Philadelphia that overcame my reluctance to be vice-president and therefore ultimately made me president. I am now back to join you and try to work for whatever will benefit the country. The crisis is not as great now as it was at the time of the civil war, but it is a great crisis."

In spite of the heavy rain falling, 10,000 persons greeted the former president.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The July report of the Southern Pacific shows a gross increase of \$400,702, while its net decreased \$701,999, because of an increase of \$502,694 in operating expenses and taxes.
