PEAR ORCHARD FOR COLORADO

Plan Largest Acreage of Pears Under One Management in the World-- Expect Output Yearly to Run Between \$2,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., Aug. 31.—One vast orchard producing \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000 worth of pears annually is the plan proposed for the new orchard Mesa district by Professor E. P. Taylor, county horticulturist. Professor Taylor has evolved a plan for planting the entire tract across from Clifton and Grand Junction, recently brought under irrigation, in nothing but pear.

The Grand Junction valley already has the reputation of growing more pears than any other section in the United States, and if Professor Taylor's scheme is carried out more pears will be grown in the Grand valley than in all other sections of the country combined, it is estimated.

Professor Taylor has recommended orchard Mesa for pears principally because, after experiments extending over many months, he has become convinced that the pear is the ideal crop for that particular section of the Grand valley.

The acreage of pears in the valley now is less than 3000 acres, and the annual crop less than 300 cars. With the vast acreage comprised in Orchard Mesa in bearing trees the total output of pears would be very nearly 2000 cars, producing an annual revenue of \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000. Many orchardists to whom the Taylor plan has been broached are highly enthusiastic over the idea.

Extensive tests have been made to show that the Orchard Mesa district is one of the best points in the entire valley for the production of pears. Whether this is due to the altitude, texture of soil or other advantages is unknown, but it is now generally recognized that the trees in this section are free from blight, hardy and capable of withstanding cold.

During the recent heavy freeze this spring, in the unsmudged sections, pears suffered less than any other fruit. While apples and peaches suffered, the pears were practically unscathed, even where no orchard heaters were used. Young trees of other kinds are winter killed under the same conditions, while the pears, apparently because of the peculiar quality of tree and soil, can withstand almost any temperature.

The pear orchards have been the most profitable of the fruit ranches in the Grand valley, which is already famous the world over for the fortunes orchardists are making from small tracts. The average yearly output of pears for the past three years has run from 250 to 300 cars, and the growers have realized approximately \$2 per box on their crops. There are more than 40 varieties of pears grown in the Grand valley at present, although the Anjou, Kieffer, Bartlett and Flemish Beauty are the most generally grown and also considered the most profitable.

EDISON PERFECTS TALKING PICTURES

First Demonstration Shows His Latest Invention Is a Success--Perfect Union Between Voice and Motions of Pictures.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—"I take very great pleasure, gentlemen, in asking you to watch positively the last appearance of the stage door Johnny. He simply can't fall in love, you know, with a girl one hundred-thousandth of an inch thick."

With these remarks Thomas A. Edison last night began the first demonstration that has been given to any one but his own experts of his kinetophone, otherwise known as his talking pictures. A dozen newspaper men composed the audience that saw and heard the performance at the West Orange laboratories.

The picture that was thrown on the scene explained itself, literally. The figure of a man stepped forward, bowed, and then began to talk—the lips moving in perfect, unmistakable unison with the words.

The man dropped a croquet ball, its impact sounded instantly from the floor. He pounded the table with a little hammer and there was not the fraction of a second between the sight and sound of the blow.

The phonograph from which the sound of the voice and that of the "business" came was behind the scenes. The machine from which the pictures were projected was at the other end of the room, yet the synchronism was flawless.

"I'm going to put metropolitan grand opera into the hamlets of Illinois in a couple of years," Edison said afterward. "I'm going to take John Drew into parts of Iowa he never heard of. Finally I am going to take Colonel Roosevelt to the cabins of the prairies with his campaign speeches."

Two years have been spent in perfecting these talking pictures.
