FAMINE AND CHOLERA STALK THROUGH VINEYARDS OF ITALY

Government Shipping Food and Clothing to Poor--Troops Being Rushed to Quell Any Outbreak. Which is Feared.

Causes of Distress Are the Vine and Olive Crop Failures, Destruction of Homes by Earthquakes and Consequent Famine.

ROME, via the Frontier, Sept. 1.—In response to appeals for aid from Bari and other ports on the Adriatic and even as far south as Reggio, the government is shipping food and clothing for the poor and the chamber of deputies is preparing to vote "distress grants" for the relief of the people.

Meanwhile, reports are becoming more frequent that disorder and riot have occurred at many places owing to the distressing conditions. The government, while extending aid, has announced that any outbreak will be dealt with summarily and troops have been rushed to the affected districts.

The causes of the distress are the vine and olive crop failures, the destruction of homes by earthquakes and the consequent famine induced by the lack of employment of the masses. Added to this, cholera has become epidemic, having affected the country from Odessa.

DURAND, Mich., Sept. 1.—Charges of neglect of duty on the part of employes of the Grand Trunk railway were contained in testimony of Alexander McAfee, a farmer who was a witness today in the Duffield wreck case in which 12 Pullman passengers were killed. McAfee said that Engineer Spencer and one passenger attempted to extinguish the fire burning in one coach in which passengers were caught. He alleged that the other members of the crew did nothing. McAfee said he saw a woman burning to death and attempted to aid her. He told the trainmen of the fact and they declared that the object burning was not a human form.

The Medford Concrete Construction company has received its incorporation papers and will commence the erection of a factory within the next few days, and as soon as the building is completed the machinery necessary for the production of cement sewer pipe, drain tile, brick blocks, etc., will be on the ground for installation. The company has already booked a number of contracts for sewer pipe at Medford, and through the valley, and there is already enough business arranged for to keep the plant running for a year. This company will employ about 20 men continually at its factory, besides carrying on a general contracting business.

GREAT DISCREPANCY APPLE CROP ESTIMSTE

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 1.—The National Apple Show Bulletin, official journal of the third national apple show in Spokane, the week of November 14 will have the following editorial under the heading, "Crop Estimates Far Apart," in its September number:

"The annual discussion over estimates of the apple crop of the United States is well under way.

"There is a marked discrepancy between estimates made up by the government authorities and by the International Apple Shippers' association, which recently concluded its convention at Niagara Falls.

"It is a most difficult matter to estimate crops of apples, or, in fact, any kind of fruit. It is a well known fact that a large crop will invariably be over-estimated and a small crop will be under-estimated. It is natural for growers to be pessimistic about damage when his crop is reduced and to be over-confident when nature favors him.

"There are thousands of new acres coming into bearing in the northwest this year, but at the same time the orchards in the far eastern states are deteriorating, while those in the middle west have suffered much by frosts and drought.

"The Pacific northwest will have a large crop this year and high prices should prevail, because of the shortage in the east and the superior quality of northwestern apples this season."

The foregoing bears out the prediction made in these dispatches several weeks ago, when it was announced that the feeling among growers in the northwest was there will be no cheap apples this season, even though the crop would be the largest ever harvested in the Pacific group, which takes in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Colorado, California and Utah.
