out the immediate rental of two or three temporary additional school-rooms and the hiring of several more teachers," the school official continues. Although Washington school is congested throughout, the primary grade, taught by Miss Philbrook, carries off the first prize as to numbers enrolled. In this room the little tots are crowded three in a seat and are perched around the rostrum besides.

The high school has fully 25 per cent larger enrollment this fall than last. Although the figures are not all in yet, Professor Collins expects that it will easily reach the 150 mark.

The North school, although crowded to full capacity, will not need any addition to the teaching staff this year. From present figures Superintendent Collins expects that the total enrollment in the Medford public schools will be 1000.
