SCHOOLS ARE CROWDED.

There has been an increase of 268 in the total enrollment in the Medford public schools over that of the beginning of last year. The total enrollment is now 1013, while last year it was 845. The high school at present has 151 students in attendance, while its registration included 125 last fall. The Washington school on the second day has 521 students, while last year on the second day of school there were only 450 enrolled. The enrollment of the north school has grown from 275 to 371.

The rapid growth of the city is responsible for the overflow.

An important change has been made by Superintendent Collins in the time schedule of the school. The children are being dismissed this semester at a quarter to twelve rather than sharply on the meridian, thus giving the children time to get home for lunch at 12.

"Many of the children belong to families of workmen," states Mr. Collins, "who must dine sharply at 12. When the children come dragging in late it necessitates a double meal for the household." No time has been lost by this change in the schedule as school takes up at a quarter after one instead of 1:30, as formerly. The students will be excused in the afternoon 15 minutes earlier than usual and the recess periods correspondingly shortened. All of the other schools of the state have 3:30 and 3:45 as the hours of dismissal, and 4 o'clock, which has been the closing time in Medford since the beginning of the schools has seemed irksome to both teachers and students.

Merchants Discuss Paving.

The Merchants' association met last evening and discussed the matter of paving the principal streets leading into the city before the winter rains set in, in order that the country trade could more easily reach the city. No formal action was taken by the business men, who will meet again next Monday evening to consider the matter further.

The merchants also took up the matter of having hitching posts provided in the city for the out-of-town people who drive in to transact business. This is an imperative need.
