It is a cross of a Keiffer and the Duchess, but none of the Duchess weakness is shown in the pear. It has been named Douglas as it is from that county in Kansas. It was grown from seed sown in a row in the orchard. It has had no pet care but it has produced from 1902, its first year in bearing, to the present time. It failed only in 1907, when all other fruits was cut off by the frost.






