## LITTLER TONE IN LIVE STOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 6.—Receipts for the week at the Portland Union stockyards have been as follows: Cattle 869, sheep 2200, hogs 1185, horses and mules 19.

In spite of the light receipts, there has been a listless tone to the market because of the heavy purchases of the week before by the packers. There was no change in price from the low values of last week. Prices at the week's close showed a slight upward tendency.

The sheep market has been evenly supplied and the market has been steady at the prices of the week before. A few good wethers sold at \$4.15 and no lambs reached the market at a higher price than \$5.50.

The greater part of the hog supply was sold to arrive and consignments reached the hog level at \$10.35. The light offerings were eagerly snapped up at high prices.

## WAIL AGAINST HINDUS PRODUCES AN EFFECT

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—That the wail against the influx of Hindu laborers to the Pacific coast is bearing fruit was attested by the arrival of the liner Siberia with only 22 Hindus aboard, although 500 had made application for passage. The balance were rejected by physicians of the steamship company pending examinations imposed by the company on all Hindu immigrants. According to one of the Hindus, the word has been passed out that only healthy young men under 30 years of age have any chance of gaining admittance to the United States.

## GROWERS IN KANSAS PHOTOGRAPH NEW PEARS

A new pear originating in Kansas will soon be offered to the planters. It is a large, late ripening variety before the Keiffer, but it is far better quality. It never has any of the hard gritty part of the Keiffer, and in fact none of its faults, but all its merits intensified. It is a cross of a Keiffer and the Duchess, but none of the Duchess weakness is shown in the pear. It has been named Douglas as it is from that county in Kansas. It was grown from seed sown in a row in the orchard. It has had no pet care but it has produced from 1902, its first year in bearing, to the present time. It failed only in 1907, when all other fruits was cut off by the frost.

## ENTIRE COMMISSION WANTED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—Claiming that the rate here in the western cases will be the most important of any conducted by the government, the Illinois Manufacturers' association today telegraphed President Taft requesting him to direct that the full membership of the Interstate commerce commission hear the case instead of a special examiner only.

Auditor Tobin of the Wabash system testified that there have been no dividends from 1905 to 1910, but admitted that one-fourth of the gross earnings were paid the Pittsburg Terminal company for terminal facilities. The auditor admitted that the Wabash owed \$1,000,000 worth of Terminal company stock and controlled the company and the Wheeling & Lake Erie company. Shippers contend that the dividends accruing to the road from these subsidiary companies offset the Wabash's plea of poverty.

The Rock Island road offered to submit records to disprove the charge that its capitalization figures had been juggled.

The hearing adjourned temporarily till the afternoon until September 19. The examiners will take testimony of eastern officials in New York Wednesday.
