In New Hampshire.

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 7.—In- sургents won a victory in the direct primaries yesterday when Robert Bass, progressive, was nominated over Bertram Ellis, regular Republi- can. The vote was nearly two to one in favor of Bass. Two-thirds of the 290 election districts give Bass 12,486; Ellis 7687; Carr (Dem.), unopposed, received 5399.

Congressman Sulloway, regular, was renominated over Burroughs, also regular. Senator Gallinger and former Senator Chandler were de- feated as delegates to the Republi- can state convention.

"The political wrongs done to New Hampshire by the Republican olig- archy prior to 1906 have been re- buker by the reforms of 1910," was the comment of Chandler on the re- sult. "The progressive movement begun in the nation by Roosevelt in 1908, and in New Hampshire under Churchill, has been approved by the Republicans of the state.

The Republicans today blame the bad weather and a bitter personal attack on Mead for the falling off in the vote, and declare that, both conditions being unusual, the vote does not reflect conditions in general.

In New Mexico.

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 7.—Re- turns today indicate that the Republi- cans have secured between 60 and 70 seats in 100 in the convention that will frame the tentative char- ter for the new state. A heavy vote was cast.

The result of the election indicates the defeat of a plan to incorporate in the charter initiative and referen- dum clauses. The Republicans avowedly favor the exclusion of the initiative and referendum from the charter and their consideration by other means.

The western counties carried the day for the Republicans. Through- out the eastern section of the territory the Democrats secured a good lead.

In Nevada.

CARSON, Nev., Sept. 7.—Govern- or Denver S. Dickerson has been renominated by the Democrats to head the state ticket this fall, ac- cording to partial returns received today from yesterday's direct primary. The Democrats endorsed Key Pittman for United States senator and nominated C. H. Baker for at- torney-general.

W. A. Massey was nominated for the governorship by the Republicans, returns today indicate, although his lead over T. L. Oddle is slight.

Visit of Special Agent Merrill Raises Hopes of Residents of That Section—Crescent to Be Connected With Outside World.

Crescent, Oregon, Sept. 7.—Within thirty days Crescent will have tele- phonic communication with the out- side world, according to Special Agent Merrill of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company, who has made a complete tour of the Deschutes valley, beginning at Sha- niko and ending at Klamath Falls.

Mr. Merrill's trip was for the pur- pose, he said, of acquiring data re- garding the business that would like- ly come to his company if the line is extended through to Klamath Falls. An independent company, with head- quarters at Prineville, has a line from Shaniko to Rosland, twenty miles north of here, and now has the wire and equipment for the exten- sion. From the statements of Mr. Merrill regarding telephone business in Central Oregon, it is inferred that the independent company's holdings will shortly be taken over by the Bell people.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 7.—Uncle Sam's pure food inspectors have seized 101 cases of "yellow true eggs substitute" at a warehouse here. The seizure was authorized by R. M. Wharton, who says that the product contains only a portion of the white of the egg mixed with milk, casein and starch and colored to re- semble a dried egg. The egg substi- tute is manufactured in Santa Mon- ica, Cal.

NEW AIRSHIP LINE TO BE ABANDONED

BERLIN, Sept. 7.—The commer- cial airship line recently opened at Strassburg may be abandoned, ac- cording to reports current today, be- cause of German military authorities fear that foreign spies may photo- graph fortifications from the aerial craft.

The authorities complain that many passengers on the initial trip were foreigners and that some of them carried cameras. Fear that photographs will be made of the fortifications of Strassburg and other defensive works near the French border has led to the demand that the airship line be transferred to some other place.

Since the arrest of two Englishmen on the island of Borkum on the charge of espionage, the spy fear has been growing. Military experts de- clare that espionage is being car- ried on among the European powers to an extent hitherto unprecedented.

KANAKA HAS HARD TIME ON DESERT ISLE

HONOLULU, Sept. 7.—After sus- sisting for four months on raw flour and flesh, Kalau Kanuhue, 14, a Hawaiian, was rescued last week from the barren island of Kahool- awe. For companions, the boy had only goats, which he had been left to tend by companions who sailed away in a boat and then failed to return for him. The boy was with- out fire all the time he spent on the island. Many times boats passed al- most within hailing distance, but his signals were unheeded, and because of the sharks that infest the neigh- borhood he was afraid to venture swimming in their path. A Japa- nese fishing sampan finally took him off.
