Rogue River Orchard Land Company Report Sale of Hamilton Tract at Eagle Point to a Mr. Lake of Chicago, Ill.

The Rogue River Orchard Land company report the sale of the Hamilton tract at Eagle Point, consisting of 1140 acres, to a Mr. Lake of Chicago for \$125,000. The property is to be subdivided and sold in small tracts.

A part of this land was purchased and planted last spring. The balance will be planted and sold under the unit plan.
