CROP IS FAIRLY GOOD IN CANADA

MONTREAL, Sept. 9.—The continued reports of a shortage in the fruit crop in the Niagara peninsula do not appear serious to city fruit dealers. That the early crop of small fruits will not be and has not been up to the mark is admitted, but little fear is felt for the late fruit.

Messrs. Hart and Tuckwell of McGill street have been in communication with the growers in the Niagara fruit belt and a representative of the firm expressed the feeling of satisfaction held an existing conditions.

"Much of the talk of poor crops comes from those who hope to influence British buyers, now in the country contracting for large quantities of fruit. After we had heard so much about a poor crop and the exporters had been led to buy up everything or anything, we were able to get all the good apples we wanted for local trade. This year will probably end the same way."

This year, according to buyers, Montreal has seen a bountiful supply of the best quality of Niagara melons. Perhaps the best Niagara melons that have been brought to Montreal in years have sold on the local fruit exchange at a price 10 cents lower than a far inferior quality brought last year. The reasons the fruitgrowers give for what they claim will be a short crop are that many farmers have neglected to spray their trees, that continued cold rains met the opening blossoms in spring and that this season has produced an "increasing and unprecedented prevalence of curled leaf, a fungus disease."
