MORE TROUBLE AT AMENT DAM

Low Water Renders Temporary Ladder Inadequate—Master Fish Warden Clanton Here on Inspection Trip—Sandry at Work on Dam.

Master Fish Warden Edward Clanton spent Thursday inspecting the fish ladder at Ament dam, which has given the warden's office no end of trouble during the past year. He found that the low water had rendered the temporary ladder inadequate for the larger fish and ordered changes made at once.

Friday Deputy Warden Sandry, with a force of men, began the necessary repair work and within a few days salmon can again ascend the stream. Although the court has sanctioned the expenditure of \$25,000 in repair work to restore the Ament dam, the money is not in sight. Mr. Sanders has gone east to raise the money from the stockholders, if possible, but it will be some time before work can be begun. In the meantime, should a freshet come, the dam will be carried out.
A large run of steelhead is reported going up the Illinois river.

MANY VICTIMS OF FERRYBOAT WRECK

LUDINGTON, Mich., Sept. 9.—Between 15 and 17 members of the crew of the Pere Marquette ferry No. 18 lost their lives when the vessel foundered off Sheboygan, Wis., today, according to a wireless message late this afternoon from the Pere Marquette ferry No. 17.

Ferry No. 17 responded to the sinking vessel's wireless call for help. The first word from No. 17 after she reached the scene of the disaster was to the effect that 53 members of the crew and three passengers had been rescued. Communication was then lost.
