MAY SUTTON HAS HARD GAME.

Miss Hazel Hotchkiss Puts Up Terrific Battle for First Honors.

DEL MONTE, Cal., Sept. 10. — Miss May Sutton may still claim to be the premier woman tennis player of the United States, but the terrific battle she was compelled to fight against Miss Hazel Hotchkiss of Berkeley yesterday to retain her laurels is food for much speculation here today regarding future meetings of the pair.

In the finals of the Del Monte tournament yesterday Miss Sutton defeated Miss Hotchkiss only after three sets of the fastest and most exciting tennis ever played on the local courts.

Miss Sutton captured the first set, 7-5, after Miss Hotchkiss had fought a grim uphill battle, running three straight games to make the set 5-all. Miss Sutton, however, took the next two games and the set.

After alternating almost every other game in the second session, the former University of California player placed herself on even terms with Miss Sutton, winning handily, 6-4.

With the darkness fast gathering, the final set was the most gruelling of the three. The games were tied at 4-all when Miss Sutton forced her final rally, running out the next two and the match.

She is scheduled to meet her sister, Miss Florence Sutton, in the challenge round for the Del Monte title today.

TROUBLE LOOMS AHEAD.

Johnny Evers Is Latest to Hurl Defiance at National Commission.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Trouble is ahead for the National Baseball commission, if many more of the American and National league stars decide to play ball with an all-star team after the expiration of the regular season, despite the commission's contrary orders.

Little Johnny Evers, the Troy, N. Y., shoe merchant, better known as second baseman of the Chicago Cubs, is the latest to hurl defiance at Garry Herrmann and his national commission. Evers said today that no matter what the consequences are he will play post-season ball if he chooses.

"I see no reason why we shouldn't pull down a little extra coin," said Evers, "and I, for one, intend to do it if I have a chance. A good many of the best men in the big leagues are dissatisfied with the commission's ultimatum and you need not be surprised if several all-star teams are organized at the close of the season."

The Kid established a clear lead in the early rounds. He had Willie in a bad way, but failed to push his advantage. The gong saved Lewis in the tenth round. Although he was unable to raise a hand in his own defense, "Dixie" permitted him to stick through nearly all the round before he summoned courage enough to get in close again. Lewis was wobbling badly when the final bell rang.
