candidate in the Republican primar-  
ies for the position on the water  
board now filled by H. L. Holgate of  
Klamath Falls, and opposes F. R.  
Gettins of Coos Bay, who is the as-  
sembly recommendation. Mr. Chin-  
nock finds Southern Oregon very re-  
ceptive to anti-assembly candidates  
and feels confident that the assem-  
bly forces will be routed in all the  
Southern Oregon counties.

Because of his experience as an  
attorney, together with his knowl-  
edge of practical irrigation and wa-  
ter law, Mr. Chinnoek was selected  
for secretary of the board at its  
first meeting soon after its creation  
by the legislature in 1909. As sec-  
retary he has had opportunity to  
make a careful study of its provi-  
sions and has materially assisted in  
forming and shaping the procedure  
that has been adopted by the board  
relative to water adjudications. He  
is in perfect harmony with the pol-  
icies now adopted for carrying out  
the provisions of the water law as  
they have been worked out by the  
present superintendents, F. M. Sax-  
ton of Baker City and H. L. Holgate  
of Klamath Falls, with the advice of  
State Engineer John H. Lewis, who  
is the chairman of the water board,  
and author of the water law itself.

Water rights representing millions  
of dollars of invested capital will re-  
quire the attention of this board  
within the next few years. The water  
law has its enemies and unless care-  
fully administered could become a  
great burden instead of a help to wa-  
ter users. At present more than 60  
positions for water right adjudica-  
tions are on file in Secretary Chin-  
nock's office at Salem and many are

now in the process of adjudication,  
as are the Rogue river rights.

The water code requires that the  
superintendents have a technical and  
expert knowledge of irrigation law  
and its administration. Mr. Chin-  
nock has had considerable practice  
in the irrigated districts of the state.  
He is a graduate of the University  
of Minnesota and was established at  
Baker City and later at Portland be-  
fore accepting his appointment as  
secretary of the water board in 1909.  
This is the first election of water  
superintendents under the water law,  
the present members holding by ap-  
pointment under former Governor  
George E. Chamberlain. The first  
division, for superintendent of which  
Mr. Chinnoek is candidate, is com-  
prised of all those counties west of  
the Cascade range.

at the reservoir on the hill east of  
town three months before the water  
system was accepted by the city of-  
ficials, and had kept him there like  
a Jupiter Pluvius to open the water

gates when fires in Medford called  
for more moisture and pressure. Mr.  
Baker said that he had paid the man  
\$140 for his three months' service  
and that it was only just and right  
that the city should reimburse him  
for his expenditure. Mayor Cannon  
argued, on the other hand, that the  
city had been allowed no jurisdiction  
over the reservoir before its accept-  
ance and that only part of the bill  
should be paid. Councilman Dem-  
mer again came to the rescue of the  
mayor and council by stating that  
water had been allowed to run over  
the sides of the reservoir when the  
people of Medford and their lawns  
were thirsty. Baker claimed that lit-  
tle water was wasted and that water  
was refused the suffering people in  
order to have a full tank for a fire  
emergency. The open discussion of  
the proposition was dropped without  
any action, as Contractor Baker re-  
fused to compromise, and City Re-  
corder Telfer began reading over the  
bills against the city, including a \$3  
burial item for a deceased canine.  
The routine business transacted  
was as follows:  
An ordinance authorizing \$30,000  
of water bonds for city of Medford

was passed, as was an ordinance de-  
claring the cost of assessment for a  
water main on South Central ave-  
nue from Thirteen street to south  
city limits.  
The reports of the plumbing in-  
spector, street commissioner and the  
city recorder were accepted and  
placed on file.  
An order was passed giving Coun-

cilman Demmer authority to have a  
new roof put on the city hall.  
The Odd Fellows were granted a  
building permit for their building on  
Sixth street.  
A resolution was passed ordering  
Fir street paved from Main street  
to south city limits.  
An ordinance was passed amend-  
ing section 3 of ordinance 133, al-

lowing wooden buildings to be built  
within the fire limits at the discre-  
tion of council, providing that the  
buildings were to be used for resi-  
dence purposes only.  
A resolution ordering a sidewalk  
on Quince street from Main to  
Fourth was passed.  
An ordinance declaring the cost of  
paving North Central avenue passed.
