ALASKA RICH IN RESOURCES

So Says Attorney General Wickersham in Regard to Territory Which He Has Just Toured to Learn of Needs.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 2.—Upon his return from an extensive tour of inspection through Alaska, Attorney General Wickersham today expressed his opinion that the earlier the coal lands in the district were opened, the better. The attorney general has made a 6000-mile trip through Alaska and he announced himself as an enthusiast and strongly in favor of immediate development work.

Concerning his trip through Alaska, Mr. Wickersham said:

Transportation is necessary to the growth of Alaska and coal is necessary to transportation. It does seem illogical, to say the least, that the railroad companies in Alaska should be forced to pay \$14 a ton for Japanese or British Columbia coal when they have much better fuel near them.

"I believe that congress will this winter work out some way by which the coal mines of Alaska may be developed, looking always to the protection of the government's interest."

While declining to outline the plan that he will recommend to the president, the attorney general pronounced the query:

"Why couldn't the coal lands of Alaska be operated somewhat along the lines of the Chicago Traction companies. The city of Chicago has at any time the right to take over the traction lines upon payment to the operators of an amount sufficient to reimburse them. I believe that coal operators would develop the Alaskan fields upon indeterminate contracts if they were assured that when their contracts were terminated, they would be reimbursed for their investment."

"The fisheries," said he, "are similar to the mineral richness of Alaska. No one can begin to compute them. It is possible that in time the cod fisheries in Alaska will equal those of New Foundland."
