INDIAN FIGHT REPRODUCED

Buffalo Bill Gives Vivid Pictures of Pioneer Warfare Between Settlers and Aborigines—Colonel Cody's Farewell Visit to the Coast.

The principal feature with the Wild West and Far East this season is a reproduction of the Battle of Summit Springs, one of the deciding conflicts in the government's task of subduing the redskin. Colonel William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) participated in the original battle on July 11, 1869, at Summit Springs, near the western border of Nebraska. In this battle Chief Tall Bull, who was in command of the renegade Indians, or "Dog Soldiers," as they were called, was shot and killed by Buffalo Bill. This important incident will, of course, be reproduced as a part of the realistic mimic battle. General E. A. Carr, who was in command of the government forces, General E. M. Hayes, General William P. Hall and other officers who participated in the original conflict, are still alive and will be impersonated in the scene. Incidental to the battle will be shown many interesting features of Indian life; the erection of an Indian village will be depicted, and incidents of Indian camp life will be faithfully depicted. The attack by the troops under General Carr will constitute a stirring scene and the rigors of war will be dramatically illustrated. The battle of Summit Springs, while the chief feature of the exhibition, will by no means constitute the only scene of western life. There will also be the Overland emigrant train and settlers' trail-side camp, in which scene there will be blended the pleasures and pastimes of the plainmen with the horrors of an Indian attack upon the whites. The three big scenic features will be of exceptional interest because of their historic correctness, and because of their value as replicas of scenes taken from an eventful period in our nation's past. The exhibitions of horsemanship by the roughrider contingent will form a novel and interesting section of the program, and at every performance the only and original Buffalo Bill will be in the saddle directing the entertainment and participating therein. Contrasting with these pictures of far western life will be seen an oriental display of great beauty; a pageantry of color and customs in strong contrast to the strenuous scenes and incidents of the Wild West. Incidental to the Far East scene, and as a special feature thereof, Ross's Musical elephants will be seen in a brilliant and truly wonderful exhibition of animal training.

This visit is rendered interesting as the final appearance here of Buffalo Bill.

PEDIGREES FOR APPLE TREES

Thoroughbred Stock to Be Registered, the Same as Livestock—Unique Innovation of Orchardist in Yakima District.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 15.—Growing thoroughbred apple trees, to be registered the same as livestock with pedigrees, is an innovation in Eastern Washington. H. M. Lichty, an orchardist in the Yakima-Sunnyside district, west of Spokane, has perfected a plan to place the science of growing commercial fruit of the highest quality and color and uniform size upon a practical basis. Explaining his plan, Mr. Lichty said that in every thoroughly cultivated apple orchard there are trees which stand out for yielding most of the prizewinners at national and state shows. Scions are taken from these and transferred to other trees by budding and grafting, thus raising the quality. The trees are re-recorded upon an orchard plat, then registered and a pedigree is issued to the grower. "I do not claim that all trees so grown will produce premium-winning fruit," he added, "as that cannot be said of pedigreed livestock; but the experience of the foremost growers in the northwest and other parts of the United States and Canada will show that a greater percentage of high-grade trees is raised by following a common-sense system than by orcharding in the old haphazard way. My own experiments prove there are superior strains of the several varieties of standard apple trees."

Professor W. S. Thornber, head of the horticultural department at the State of Washington college, Pullman, and growers in the apple belts in Eastern Washington and elsewhere, approve the Lichty plan, the former saying that the products of healthy trees may be improved by budding and grafting from superior stock. He added there is just as much difference in apple trees of the same variety as there is in horses of the same breed. The plan of registering trees and keeping a record of yielding performances is also endorsed.

ZEPPELIN LOSES GREAT AIRSHIP THROUGH FIRE

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—Count Zeppelin's great airship, Zeppelin VI, was destroyed by fire near Baden Baden today. The airship was a dirigible of the Zeppelin type and was one of the largest aircraft ever constructed. Occasionally we meet a man whose train of thought reminds us of a row of flat cars.
