GRIDIRON STARS CLUSTERED HERE

Many Famous Football Players and Athletes Now Making Their Homes Around Medford—Talk of Forming Medford Team.

Why not form a Medford football eleven, is the question being asked each other by the college men living in and around Medford.

There are many former gridiron champions at work in the orchards around Medford. Among them is Brooks Spencer, who for four years was one of the mainstays of Yale's line. His position was at guard. He was graduated only this last June and his loss is being felt keenly by the coaches who are rounding up the defenders of the blue for the fall season.

Van Hovenburg, Columbia's famous All-American end in 1902, is another football star whose present occupation is raising fruit in the Rogue River valley and who would be a strong man for the Medford team. Van Hovenburg played on that famous Columbia team that defeated Yale. One of his teammates, both on the Columbia team and on the Van Camp's All-American eleven, was Dick Smith, an Oregon boy who first won his letter at the state university. Smith until recently has been a lawyer in Klamath Falls.

There are many other football stars who have come into the valley and are unknown except to a small coterie of friends from their home state.

R. W. Hitchcock, an orchard owner near Eagle Point, carried off first honors for Cornell in 1909 in the quarter-mile race of the intercollegiate meet, his time being 49 4-5 seconds. Henry Griffin is one of the college literary geniuses who are looking for a location in the valley and who is an enthusiastic booster for a Medford eleven. Griffin was editor-in-chief of the Cornell Daily Sun, which is recognized as the foremost college paper of the land.

As well as noted eastern athletes, there are some men who have won high honors in the Oregon institution. Olen Arnsperger, who has been ill for a month past with an abscess in the ear, was for four years chosen for the all-northwest team and in 1908 was assistant coach at the university of Oregon, his alma mater. Dr. Thayer and Walter McIntyre are other old "Oregon" stars located in Medford. B. F. Hall, teacher in the high school, won against all-comers in the hammer-throw when he was in attendance at the Oregon Agricultural college. Bennett, a Jackson county boy, was for five years a star on the O. A. C. football eleven.

The great number of college men in the valley for some time past have felt the need of a university club. When the men come in from their farms they have no place to lounge around and visit but the hotel lobbies.

C. A. Malboeuf has promised to send out a circular letter asking the college men to come together and discuss plans for such an organization. If the plans for a football team are realized, the management would come under the University club.
