**PERNOLL PITCHES VICTORY.**

Wins Exciting Games for Detroit in Driving Rain.

Of late there has been very little heard of Jud Pernoll, who is playing with the Detroit team of the American league, but the Detroit News Tribune of September 4 has the following to say of the Grants Pass pitcher. The heading of the article says: "Pernoll Pitches Tigers to Victory in a Driving Rain," and then comes the following:

"The credit of the game should rightfully go to Murphy, but several other gentlemen will shoulder the credit since Mr. Murphy's star play cannot be made official. Owen Bush and Henry Huston Pernoll, the last name representing the leading resident of Grants Pass, Or., and who, with General U. S. Grant, shares the honor of setting that city on the map.

"The leading resident of Grants Pass has a habit of throwing a ball from his left side and since Hughie Duffy has a number of men in his lineup who bat left-handed, Hughie Jennings thought it wise to shove Mr. Pernoll into the box for the afternoon. He performed nobly, not alone pitching good ball against the gentleman from Chicago, but won by his fielding as well. He made two stops, coming in close succession, which rivaled any fielding feat performed by a twirler at Bennett park this season.

"Pernoll has not quite rid himself of that short delivery. He still possesses that habit of giving his shoulder a short, backward movement, thrusting out his arm, jolt style, and snapping the ball. Hughie tried to cure him of this habit and has partly succeeded, but it will take more efforts on the part of Pernoll to establish a free movement of the left arm for himself.

"At that the stout gentleman from Grants Pass, Oregon, U. S. A., uncorrected some twirling that was too effective for the White Sox. Pernoll has pitched in seven games for Detroit. He is credited with winning four and losing three. Had he secured a free movement during the early months of the season he would probably have had a record by this time that would beat his present one hollow."

Then follows a summary of the game, describing the effective work of Pernoll. Many of the admirers of Pernoll in southern Oregon have feared that he would not make good and not hearing anything about him for the past couple of months, thought he might be out of the game. It must be remembered that he is playing in the fastest company in the world, and until this year has had no experience in fast company, consequently there many things for him to learn, and if there had not been good stuff in him Detroit would have released him long ere this. There is no question but that Pernoll is going to be one of the best pitchers in the country, but he is young and still has time, but if he puts his mind to it and under able instructors he will win out. It can be seen by the above that he is much thought of and that Detroit has no idea of letting him go. Pernoll's average among the pitchers is 500 per cent up to September 2.

**HARD BATTLE FOR WHITE.**

Will Tangle With Abe Attell Before National Athletic Club.

**MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 16.**—Charley White is slated to tackle one of the hardest battles of his career tonight when he tangles with Abe

Attell before the National Athletic club.

The little fellows will battle ten rounds at catch weight. Attell will have a three-pound edge on his opponent. He weighed 125 this morning and expects to enter the ring a pound heavier.

Attell declared he is in the best condition he has reached since his return from the Pacific coast, where he met Owen Moran in a ten-round go at Los Angeles. Attell expects to outpoint White easily and possibly to land a sleep wallop before the wire is reached. No decision will be given in the ring.

**TEMPEST IN PUGILISTIC POT.**

**CHICAGO, Sept. 16.**—Packy McFarland's announcement that he cannot make the weight stipulated in his agreement with Champion Ad Wolgast is causing a tempest in the pugilistic pot.

Tom Jones, the champion's foxy manager, wants Packy's \$500 forfeit money and threatens to sue the stockyard scrapper unless he yields up the coin.

The doctory Wolgast, however, disclaims such mercenary desires. On the contrary, he magnanimously offers to meet McFarland at any old weight. Jones is unwilling that the champion shall risk prestige against a welterweight, although, of course, the lightweight title would not be involved.

McFarland's inability to make 133 pounds, it is believed here, once and for all eliminates him from the lightweight ranks. In all probability he will have to search among the heavier lads for his future lunch money.
