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BARTLETT PEARS MAKE A GAIN

Feature of Market Is Sharp Advance From 50 to 60 Cents a Box—The Greatest Decline Was on Tokay Grapes.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—The feature of this week's California deciduous fruit market was a sharp advance on Bartlett pears, from 50 to 60c per box. With the exception of this, there was very little change in the market. California plums and prunes would decline one day and recover the next day. They closed about like last week. The same conditions existed on peaches. Grapes were in much heavier supply and consequently prices were a shade lower, although the market was firm. The greatest decline was on Tokays, offerings of which were heavy and prices about 50c lower. Offerings for the week comprised 151 cars against 158 cars last week. Of these, 101 cars were California deciduous fruit, 21 cars northwestern fruit, 10 cars Washington peaches, 5 cars Colorado peaches and 15 cars Utah peaches. The quality and condition of the fruit was generally good and in some cases excellent.

Some Bartlett pears showed fine quality and condition, and it was on these that the advance of 50 to 60c was noted. While Malaga grapes were generally good, some Tokays showed considerable waste. Italian prunes were generally of good quality, sound and well packed. Peaches were also good, both as to quality and condition.
