## LIVE STOCK VALUES RULE VERY SLOW

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 19.—Live stock values have ruled very firm in Portland during the past week.

Steers were sold as high as \$5.75, while best cows went as high as \$4.75. There was not as good prices received for off grade cattle and at one time during the week bulls dropped 5c.

Hogs moved up to \$10.75 during the week and a number of loads were taken at the high point.

Sheep and lambs were steady to firm with prices practically unchanged from last week.

Much interest is being displayed by the trade in the announcement of a new and modern packing plant, of immense size, by S. & S. in Portland. The company is now temporarily at work in the old Zimmerman plant at South Portland, but the lease will expire before long and will not be renewed. A new plant, said to be somewhat larger than that erected by Swift & Co. on the peninsula, will be erected without delay and for that reason one of the head officials of the S. & S. company is hurrying to Portland. It is likewise said to be the intention of the company to build and equip a modern and up-to-date stockyards here that will be open for all shippers. Prices on livestock were:

Calves—Best, \$7.00; ordinary, \$6; poor, \$4 @ 5.

These are all hard players and have had the benefit of one year's coaching under Hall, the old O. A. C. star. Frank Tarrel, the fullback of last season, may return to high school later in the fall.

The heaviest loss that the team has received is Virgin Strang. Strang has played a phenomenal game at end during two years and will be greatly missed on this year's lineup. He leaves today for Corvallis, where he will be a strong candidate for end on the O. A. C. eleven.
