NEW YORK AFTER GRAFTING POLICE

Commissioner Baker Slated for Removal—Acting Mayor Calls on Gaynor to Confer With Him Regarding the Matter.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—A shake-up in the police department is imminent, according to rumor today, as the result of a visit last night by Acting Mayor Mitchell to the home of Mayor Gaynor.

Commissioner Baker is to be removed as the result of the widespread reports of police graft in the tenderloin, according to the rumor, and others are to follow. The grand jury is to consider charges of grafting in the department this week and an investigation that will involve many of the higherups in police circles is predicted.

OFFICIALS WORRIED BY LOST BALLOON

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 20.—Reports that a balloon without a car, but carrying a dark object, apparently a man, had passed over Pulaski, Pa., sailing south yesterday morning, has just reached the officials of the motor speedway, from which the balloons in the two big races of Saturday sailed. The officials are extremely worried today. Two of the big gas bags that sailed away in the races have not yet been heard from and it is feared that one of them may have met with an accident.

The two balloons yet to hear from are New York, Clifford B. Harmon, pilot, Thomas Baldwin, aide, and the Miss Sophia, with Thomas Assman, pilot, P. J. McCullough aide. The Buekeye was reported today. J. H. Wade of Cleveland telegraphed the speedway officials that the Buekeye landed at Showalter, Floyd county, Virginia, yesterday morning. A. H. Morgan, aide, and Wade are both safe and the trip was successful, according to the dispatch. The balloon landed in a place inaccessible to telephone or telegraph and the news of the landing could not be sent in sooner.

The officials here fear that one of the other balloons may have met with an accident in the storm through which at least three of the big bags passed. It is feared that the storm chilled the gas and the balloon sank until either the drag rope or the basket caught in the trees and that the driving wind broke the cordage and the balloon swept free with one of its crew still clinging to the netting. Efforts are being made today to trace the balloon further, but the country over which it is supposed to be sailing is out of direct touch with telegraph lines.

AUTHORITIES FORBID FLIGHT ACROSS ALPS

BRIEG, Switzerland, Sept. 20.—Although the authorities today forbade Aviator Weyman and Chaviz attempting a flight across the Alps because weather conditions are so unfavorable as to make the attempt extremely hazardous, the two bird men are determined to attempt the flight as soon as it is at all practicable. Both men had their machines out today and were preparing to attempt the flight in spite of the fact that the wind was blowing more briskly than it was yesterday, when they were forced to descend to prevent being dashed on the rocks. The authorities told the aviators that they will not be allowed to make the flight today.
