SUPPLEMENTARY ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

Know all men by these presents: That we, John A. Baxter, B. H. Harris, L. W. Smith and John H. Carkin, the undersigned, directors of the Gold Hill Railroad and Lumber Company, a corporation, and all of them, by virtue of the laws of the State of Oregon in such cases made and provided and pursuant to a resolution adopted by the stockholders of said corporation duly and legally passed, have made and subscribed these Supplementary Articles of Incorporation, for and on the part of said Gold Hill Railroad and Lumber Company, aforesaid.

Article I.

The name of this corporation shall be the GOLD HILL RAILROAD AND LUMBER COMPANY, and its duration shall be perpetual.

Article II.

The enterprise, business, pursuit and occupation in which this Corporation proposes to engage is that of Coal, Oil, Lumber, Realty, Water Power, Railroad, Telegraph and Telephone Lines and Mining for Gold and other Minerals, and it shall have powers as follows:

To mine, buy, sell, import, export, and generally deal in anthracite, bituminous and semi-bituminous coal and to this end purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, hold, own, mortgage, sell, operate, and control any properties thought to contain coal.

To prospect, bore, drill for, and produce oil and natural gas; to purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire lands believed to contain oil and gas and to erect and maintain thereon pumping and drilling stations and the facilities and conveniences that may be necessary or required in and about such business.

To purchase, acquire, hold, lease, manage, control and operate and, to sell, lease and dispose of to such person or persons, corporation or corporations, and for such price or prices, and on such terms and conditions, as to this corporation may seem proper, water, water rights, power, privileges and appropriations, for mining, milling, agricultural, domestic, and other uses and purposes and to develop, control, and to generally deal in and dispose of the same to such person or persons, corporation or corporations, and for such price or prices, and on such terms and conditions as to this corporation may seem proper, electrical and other power for the generation and supply of electricity for light and heat, and for any other uses and purposes to which the same are adapted.

To sell on commission or otherwise orchard, coal, oil, mineral and timber lands. To acquire by purchase, lease, own, hold, mortgage, or encumber both improved and unimproved real estate wherever situated, whether it be orchard, timber, coal, oil, mineral, or other land and to survey, subdivide, plat, and improve the same, for the purpose of sale or otherwise.

To buy, lease, sell, operate, construct mills, dams, sawmills and to manufacture lumber, shingles, laths, boxes and all other mill stuffs and to operate retail lumber yards to handle lumber, coal, and wood, together with woodyards and other yards that may be necessary or convenient in the sale of any timber products or coal.

To build, construct, operate and manage, control and own railroads; to purchase, buy, lease, or acquire any other equipment, supplies and accessories necessary and appropriate for the operation of the same; to acquire rights of way for such railroads by purchase, lease or condemnation proceedings under the right of eminent domain, and to dispose of, sell or lease such railroads, for such price, and upon such terms as may to this corporation seem proper.

To prospect for, locate, acquire by discovery, lease or purchase, and to hold, possess and operate mineral lands and claims; and to carry on the business in all its various branches of mining for gold, silver, tin, lead, iron, and other minerals, and to such end to contract, own and operate dredges, sluices, tunnels, mills, smelters, refineries and other equipment such as may be necessary or convenient for the working of such lands.

Article III.

The principal office and place of business of this corporation shall be at Medford, in Jackson County, State of Oregon.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be divided into Ten Thousand shares of the par value of TEN DOLLARS EACH.

Article VI.

constructed by this corporation shall be a point at and near Gold Hill, Oregon, known as Chavner's Junction,

where said road connects with the Southern Pacific Railroad and a point at or near Section Two (2) in Township Thirty-Seven (37) South of Range Three (3) West of the Willamette Meridian.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE

TAXATION AND NO RELIEF TO THE FARMER

Greater Oregon Home Rule association asks the farmers to disfranchise themselves in favor of brewers, distillers and saloon domination of cities and towns, both little and big. When a campaign is on in any town, no matter what its size, the whisky cry is: "Don't put out the saloons or the farmers will not come here to buy; for they go where they can get booze." Evidently the farmer is now distrusted, for in the amendment to the constitution of the state submitted by the Greater Oregon Home Rule association the attempt is made to bar the farmer from the right to say whether saloons shall exist in his town or not. They expect the farmer to pay taxes to prosecute the crime and to care for the criminals produced by the saloons; and to give his boy and his girl to the saloon's demoralizing influence; but they propose to deny him the right to say whether the saloon may exist to make taxes for him to pay and to ruin his boy or his girl. Our forefathers rebelled against such a proposition, but this Greater Oregon Home Rule association is so blinded to the injustice of this that they even ask the farmer to disfranchise himself by voting for this amendment.

Here is the Greater Oregon Home Rule association's amendment as it will appear on the official ballot:

(Proposed by Initiative Petition.)

For constitutional amendment giving to cities and towns exclusive power to license, regulate, control, suppress or prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors within the municipality.

Vote Yes or No.

Again, when a move is made to put the saloons out of a town, immediately the whisky cry is: "Don't put the saloons out of this town and leave them in the adjoining town, but put them out of all the towns in the county. Make it a county or a state issue and we are with you."

Now they fear that the people will make the county or the state dry and so they embody in this amendment the principle that every little town should settle the question for itself. The truth is that they care for no principle of government, but only for the maintenance of the saloon.

We hold that from present indications the Greater Oregon Home Rule association is nothing but the political central committee of the brewers, distillers and saloons; for of the many measures before the people by initiative petition, the Greater Oregon Home Rule association makes the argument for this amendment, which gives to each town absolute control over its saloons, regardless of the county or state; and it makes also the argument against the prohibition amendment and the prohibition law, and has nothing to say on any other question.

The fact that no liquor dealer is allowed in its membership is only an attempt to blind the people to its real purpose.

Is anything more needed to prove this than a quotation from a letter that the general manager, H. C. McAllister, is sending over the state to solicitors for new members to the Greater Oregon Home Rule association? Here is what he says:

"It will probably be necessary for you to explain to each prospective member what we stand for; there-



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fore, don't forget that our efforts at the present time are all directed toward the successful passage of initiative bill No. 328, giving to each town and city in the state exclusive power to regulate or prohibit the liquor traffic, as it sees fit within the municipality."

There is no question that the Greater Oregon Home Rule association is, as herein made evident by H. C. McAllister's own words, an agent of the brewers, distillers and saloon to carry out their wish.

Therefore, to maintain the rule of the people and also the best interests of the people, vote no on this amendment.

The following is the form and number in which the prohibition amendment will appear on the official ballot:

Proposed by Initiative Petition.

An amendment of section 35, of article I, of the constitution of Oregon, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor and the traffic therein within the state of Oregon, on and after the 1st day of July, A. D. 1911, excepting for medicinal, scientific, sacramental and mechanical purposes.

Vote Yes or No.

Vote yes on this amendment, for a crime that is statewide and is centered in the monopoly of the brewers and distillers must be prohibited by the fundamental law of the state. Against that law no city charter can stand.

The following is the form and number in which the prohibition law will be printed on the official ballot:

Proposed by Initiative Petition.

A bill for a law to prohibit, prevent and suppress the manufacture, sale, possession, exchange, or giving away of intoxicating liquors within the state of Oregon, except for specific purposes; to govern the shipment of the same, declaring what is intoxicating liquor within the state of Oregon, and providing penalty for violations of the act.

Vote yes on this bill, for it makes the will of the people supreme. The saloons were voted out of Jackson county in 1908 by 257 of a majority vote. They are in Jackson county against the wish of a majority of her citizens by means of Medford's whisky charter. Vote for the law that makes the will of the people supreme. The farmer has a right to say whether the saloons shall exist or not.
