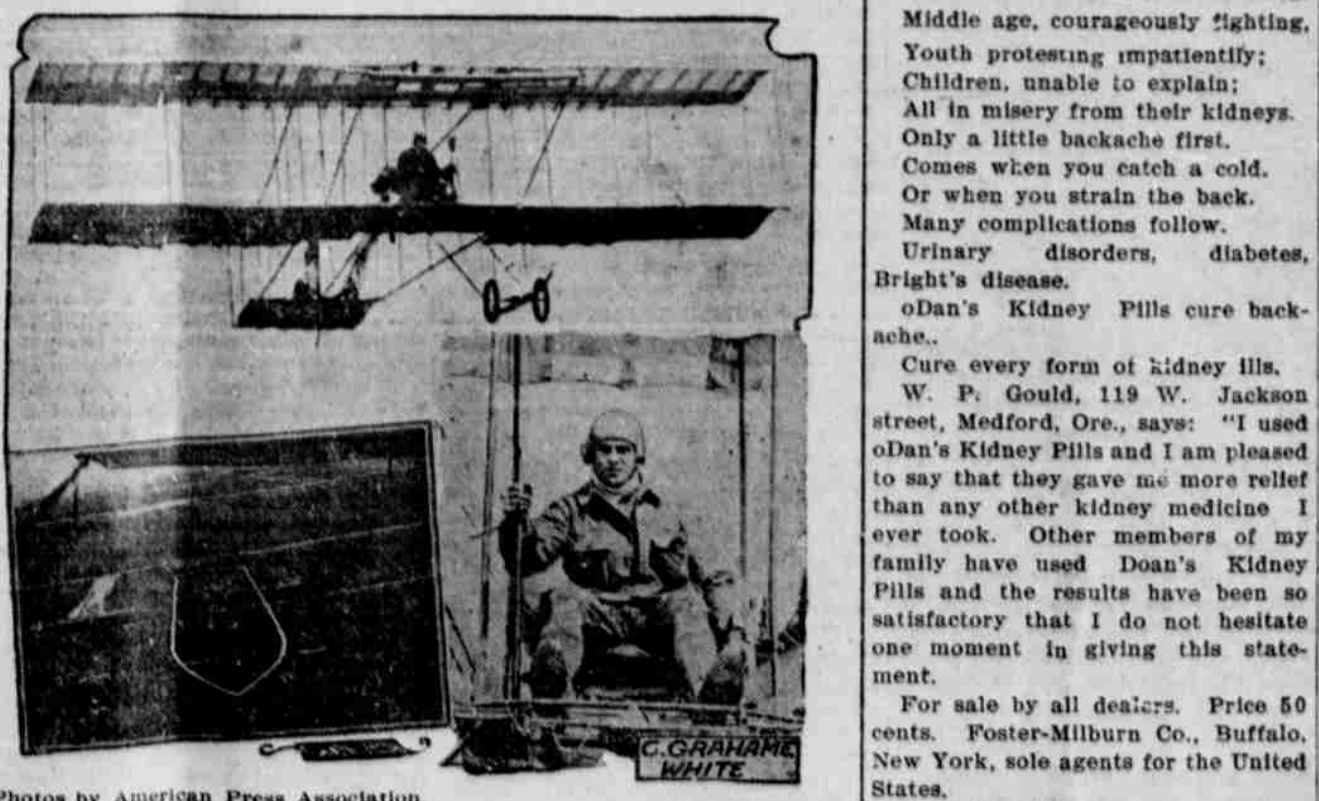

Claude Grahame White, the British aviator, has arrived in Boston preparatory for flights at the Harvard Aero club meeting and will go to San Francisco and several other cities for exhibition ascensions before taking part in the contests for the great trophies offered at the international aviation meeting to be held at Belmont track, Long Island, in October. White is probably the best known bird man of England and for several days before sailing for this country was engaged in a series of tests with imitation bombs which he successfully dropped on an imaginary battleship, the outline of which was painted on the ground. The pictures show White in the air and one of the "dummy" battleships.
