## WEEKS RECEIPTS STOCK YARDS

**Movement of Both Cattle and Sheep Unusually Heavy at Portland—Quality Only Fair to Medium—Hogs Still at \$10.75.**

PORTLAND UNION STOCK YARDS, Sept. 24.—Receipts for the week at the Portland Union stock yards have been as follows: Cattle, 2462; hogs, 1922; sheep, 4973.

The movement of both cattle and sheep has been unusually heavy this week. Nearly three thousand head of cattle and more than six thousand head of sheep have arrived.

In the cattle division the general quality has been only fair to medium, very few offerings of choice steers being made. The highest price paid this week has been \$5.50; fully 25c under the previous week's market. There has been very satisfactory markets in the butcher division, there being a very steady call for cows, with prices averaging up fairly well, although this market is also off from 15c to 25c. There has been no calls in the veal market.

The hog market has been steady to firm since the opening of business on Monday, with prices seeing sawing between \$10.50 and \$10.75, with the bulk of sales made at \$10.65. Receipts have been fair.

In the sheep division transactions have been very spirited. The arrival of several lots of Mt. Adams wethers and lambs put new life into the market and good prices rule the trading; \$4.25 was the extreme top for yearling wethers and \$5.50 for the best grade of lambs. Receipts have been unusually heavy and the market is steady to firm.

## \$3.45 BOX FOR D'ANJOU PEARS

Sgobel & Day report under date of New York, Sept. 20, as follows: Pears: One car D'Anjou from Medford averaged \$3.45, and a car of the same, but very small sizes, from Colorado, made \$2.85. One car of Clairgeous from Medford made \$1.94. Car half-boxes Comice, Anderson, San Jose, 200 sold at \$2.75, and balance probably exported. We sold two cars of Comice seconds, half boxes, \$2.50 and \$2. Also 218 half boxes, Block brand, Forelle pears at the record price of \$5.25 (say \$10.50 per whole box). Today a car, half boxes, Comice, Anderson, sold \$2.50.

Apples—Two cars from Hood River here, Kings \$2.75 to \$2.50; Gravensteins \$2.50 to \$2.25. Two cars 4 1/2 tier Gravensteins from Sebastopol averaged \$1.57 and \$1.60. This market holds firm and red apples are wanted. The English markets are very high. Liverpool yesterday on Hoods River Gravensteins averaged 13 shillings (\$3.25), and Watsonville 4 tier Newtowns 12 shillings \$3), and the freight from here to Liverpool is only 16c a box. The lack of home grown fruit, in England, France and Germany owing to very bad weather is good for satisfactory prices on apples.

## BUT FEW PEARS FOR SHIPMENT

**Nearly All California's Remaining Crop Sold on Orders Booked Some Time Ago—Heavy Shipments of Grapes Made.**

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 24.—The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week ending Friday morning, September 23:

Peaches, 59 cars. Very few peaches are still left to go forward. Shipment will probably entirely end this coming week.

Pears, 85 cars. The pear shipment appears much heavier this week than last. Forty-five cars should have been reported before, but owing to an oversight in the railroad office same was not reported. The actual movement of pears this week should be 40, therefore, instead of 85, as appears from this report. Very few cars are still available for shipment and of these few most of them have already been sold on orders booked some time since.

Weather conditions have remained exceedingly favorable since our last report.
