GREAT VIOLINIST COMING HERE

Chance is to give the music lovers of this city and the surrounding country an opportunity to hear Haroldi, the great Polish violinist, who comes here soon on his first tour in America, and who has created sensation in many of the principal cities. The unavoidable cancellation of a date already booked has left an open night in the noted artist's itinerary and his American managers, Fitzpatrick and Norwood, have decided to bring him here on that day. The local concert, thanks to Manager Hazelrigg, to whose efforts the coming of Haroldi to Medford. The program will be rendered in the New Natorium Auditorium, Monday evening, October 10.

Not since the days of Paderewski's first visit to America has an European artist created the enthusiasm which the great Haroldi has. Everywhere the press, critics and public have proclaimed the greatness of this artist. Since he has, for four years, been one of the foremost soloists of Europe this was perhaps to be expected. His coming to this city will undoubtedly prove the musical event of the season. Those who will hear him will listen to an artist who is totally unlike any artist who has ever toured the country.
