



## FORM ORATORICAL SOCIETY SOON

A meeting is to be held Monday night for the purpose of organizing an Oratorical society at the Natorium. The first meeting is for the purpose of the election of officers and the appointing of committees. Medford has arrived at a point musically where an organization of this kind will be of great benefit; the class of music to be studied will be the standard oratorios. This will be of great assistance to the different church choirs, inasmuch as it will be thorough work along the line of music used in the different churches. Besides, Medford being as it is situated between Portland and San Francisco, and both of these cities holding their annual music festivals, it will be thoroughly practical for Medford to hold a spring festival and use the same solo talent and orchestra that are annually engaged by the musical societies of the larger cities of the Pacific coast. Such singers as Schumann-Heinck, Gadsby and other famous singers, as well as the Damosch, Boston Symphony or Chicago orchestra, one or more of whom make an annual tour of the Pacific coast can be engaged for a grand musical festival. It is

estimated that a chorus of at least a hundred voices, capable of singing the higher grades of music, can be got together in Medford, and now that he have so excellent and roomy accommodations in the Natorium, both for rehearsing and concerts, it seems a fitting time to begin the work. All singers interested in forming a society of this kind are invited to be present at the smaller Natorium hall Monday evening at 7:30.
