GRAZED MAN WOULD DIE

Prisoner in Grants Pass Jail Imagines 200 Men Are After Him and So He Slashes Wrists With Pocket Knife.

GRANTS PASS, Ok., Oct. 4.—

John A. Peterson, a demented prisoner at the county jail, under the hallucination that 200 men were seeking his life, attempted suicide last evening about 9 o'clock by trying to sever the arteries in both wrists with a pocket knife.

John Curran, an inmate of the jail, called for help when the crazed man attempted to take his life. Hugh DeArmond, who happened to be passing, heard his cries and sent for Deputy W. M. Chishire, who disarmed the man and summoned Dr. Flanagan, who stopped the flow of blood. Peterson had slashed both wrists and was so weak from the loss of blood when the physician arrived that he was unable to stand.

This morning the demented man was brought before the county court and committed to the asylum at Salem for insanity.

He was still in a weakened condition from his loss of blood. The doctors placed him under the influence of anesthetics and put in several stitches in his wounds preparatory to his trip to Salem. Peterson is a dope fiend, as sev-
