REPUBLIC OF PORTUGAL IS RECOGNIZED BY DIPLOMATS

BUSINESS ONCE AGAIN BECOMES NEARLY NORMAL

King Manuel at First Wanted to Stay in Lisbon and Fight But His Advisers Forced Him to Flee—Is Now Safely at Gibraltar.

LISBON, Oct. 7.—The republic of Portugal was virtually recognized today by the foreign diplomatic corps stationed here. The various ministers, headed by Sir Francis Villiers of Great Britain, called upon the provisional foreign minister, Dr. Machado, tendered their respects and received assurances from the administration that the treaty rights of foreign powers in Portugal would be protected.

It was announced that the deposed King Manuel, Queen Amelia, Dowager Queen Maria Pia and Manuel's uncle, the Duke of Oporto, would be exiled, but that their personal property rights would be respected. This is an unexpected concession by the republicans.

King Wanted to Fight. The United Press today obtained the first connected account of the movements of the royal family from the beginning of the revolution.

King Manuel at first wanted to stay in Lisbon and fight, but his advisers forced him to flee. When the Necessidades palace began to crumble under the shells of the republican-manned warships and forts, Manuel left the building by means of a secret exit and went to Mafra, north of Lisbon. Queen Amelia and the dowager queen, Maria Pia, then at Cintra, joined Manuel at Mafra. The Duke of Oporto remained in hiding until Thursday when he boarded the royal yacht Amelia and sailed to Ericeira, near Mafra.

Manuel and the others, guarded by the students of Mafra military school, went to Ericeira. On the way the young king wept bitterly and threatened constantly to return. He was dissuaded in his purpose by his mother and the party boarded the royal yacht. The little craft sailed at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon and reached Gibraltar at 11 o'clock last night. Today they wear the guests of Sir Francis Forester-Walker, governor of Gibraltar.

DEITZ HOLDS 50 OFFICERS AT BAY

If Truce Called Comes to Naught General Assault on Cabin Will Be Made—Says He Will Surrender to Governor Only.

WINTER, Wis., Oct. 7.—If the truce has been declared at the Deitz cabin at Cameron Dam, to arrange for the surrender of John Deitz, its owner, who for nearly a week has held fifty sheriff's deputies at bay, comes to naught, an assault will be ordered on the cabin today. Deitz' wife and younger children, who are with him in the cabin, will be protected, according to Sheriff Madden, who is in charge of the besiegers. Deitz' oldest son, Leslie, will be ordered either captured or slain.

The truce was declared to permit Attorney General Gilbert and the governor's secretary to confer with Deitz over the terms of his surrender. Deitz has announced he will surrender only to the governor in person and under the condition that he be given a trial in another county.

WANTED TO BE WASHINGTON OF CHINA, SAYS WOULD-BE SLAYER

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Whether George Fong, would-be assassin of Prince Tsai Hsun, will be prosecuted by the federal authorities or be turned over to the police of Oakland has not yet been decided. Fong is held as a federal prisoner in the local jail.

"I wanted to be the George Washington of China," said Fong today. "I am sorry my attempt to kill him prince failed. I wanted to kill him two weeks ago when he was here, but I couldn't get a chance. I want to set China free from the Manchus and make it a republic. Revolt is my religion."

Fong is well known in Chinese-American society here, having attended the Chinese mission schools for several years.

Local Chinese who are loyal to the emperor are greatly worried lest a repetition of the attempted assassination of Prince Tsai Hsun be attempted on board the steamer Chiyo Maru. It was rumored about Chinatown that four men were on board the liner for that purpose. Officials of the steamship company were notified shortly before the Chiyo Maru sailed and precautions against any such attempt are being taken on board.

Fong is a member of the Young China society.

IF NECESSARY TO ENFORCE LAW WILL PROSECUTE DISTRICT ATTORNEY

State Game Warden Says Deputy District Attorney Johnson Must Not Fail to Prosecute Violation of Fish Law, Even if His View of Law is Faulty.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—In his determination to enforce the laws of the state providing for the protection of trout, and other game fish inhabiting the streams of the state, State Game and Forestry Warden R. O. Stevenson declares that if necessary he will go to the extreme of prosecuting District Attorney R. F. Mulkey and Deputy District Attorney Johnson of Josephine county, the latter of whom it is alleged has declared that a trout is not a migratory fish within the meaning of the Oregon game protective statutes and that he will not prosecute violations of the act prohibiting the catching of trout within the 600 foot limit below dams.

It has been reported that Deputy District Attorney Johnson, for Josephine county, has declared that a trout is not a migratory fish and is not protected under the laws of the state and that he will decline to prosecute cases of catching trout within the 600 foot prohibitory limit, but Game Warden Stevenson has given strict orders to his deputies to arrest any and all violators of that provision of the game laws and if Deputy Johnson or District Attorney Mulkey refuse to prosecute the case he will prosecute them for malfeasance.

FIVE CONVICTS MAKE ESCAPE

For First Time in Many Years Prisoners Get Away From Sing Sing; Pursuers Prepared for Desperate Fight.

OSSINING, N. Y., Oct. 7.—Five Sing Sing convicts, heavily armed, escaped from the penitentiary here today after binding two jailers, sawing the bars off a chapel window and severing the telephone wires. Their precautions delayed pursuit for a time and they had a good start of the officers, who followed as soon as the alarm was given. The penitentiary guards are armed and prepared for a desperate fight.

THREE CLEWS DYNAMITING FOLLOWED

Out of Mass of Theories and Clews Three Leads Are Chosen by Officers—Unions Request Mayor to Keep Times From Reiterating Charges Against Them.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7.—Out of the mass of clues that might lead to the solution of the Times dynamiting the police have selected three leads which appear to them to be the most promising.

For the last 48 hours detectives have kept close watch at the home of a man whom they say frequently has been under surveillance for eastern authorities. His actions since the explosion, they say, have warranted the guard placed about his home, which is in the southwestern section of the city.

Mysterious Visit. Last night, shortly before midnight two men were seen to enter the building through a rear door. When they reappeared half an hour later they were followed by two of the officers who were watching the house. The police refuse to make public the source of their suspicions against the man.

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WAR CLOUDS ARE LOWERING OVER SUNNY SPAIN

Constant Clashes Between Civil Guard and Revolutionists Reported—Conditions in Barcelona Are General Over Kingdom.

BARCELONA, Oct. 7.—Constant clashes between the civil guard and the revolutionists have been occurring during the last 38 hours. The injured number more than a score. Conditions here are similar to those reported elsewhere. The fact that the civil guard has been called out confirms the seriousness of the situation.

Cortes Ammasses. MADRID (via Hendaye), Oct. 7.—The Spanish cortes assembled this afternoon after several postponements owing to the state of the public mind following the exciting reports from Portugal.

Premier Canalejas was besought by the monarchists to again postpone the assembling of the cortes, but he refused to do so, saying he feared the effect of such action on the people and the possible consequences to the peace of the realm.

Routine business was transacted by the national body and no reference was made to the Portuguese situation, according to official dispatches.

Queen Mother Moves. Marie Christina, mother of King Alfonso, is preparing to give up her residence in the Oriente palace, where the king lives, and take up an abode in another part of the capital. It is unofficially asserted that the queen mother decided upon this plan in an effort to convince the Spanish people that she really is not exerting a reactionary influence upon his majesty.

It is not considered probable, outside of court circles, that the queen mother is taking no part in political affairs. There was talk for a time of the queen mother's departure for Austria, her girlhood home, and such a move might have impressed the country as a step in the right direction.

BOWERMAN LEAD, OFFICIAL COUNT, IS 2934; WEST'S 2740

CAMP FIRE, SAID TO BE THAT OF DYNAMITERS, IS FOUND

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Remains of a camp fire and a cache of provisions discovered on Red Rock, an island that rises precipitately in the channel off San Quentin prison point, is believed by the police to have an important bearing on the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building. It is said that the camp effects were left by the men who secured the dynamite at Giant in the launch Peerless.

Detectives McNamara and Brown of Los Angeles and Sergeant James McGowan of the San Francisco force made the discovery today while trying to follow the trail of the launch after it left Giant.

They believe that the three men who took the powder from Giant went

to Red Rock, where they took off the false name "Peerless" from the launch, waited a day and a night and then went to Martinez, where the dynamite was put on board a train for Los Angeles. The launch that landed at Martinez was seen by fishermen as it passed the Selby Smelting works. It bore the name Pastime at that time. The detectives believe the name Peerless which was on the boat when it left Giant was removed at Red Rock. Sheriff Valle of Contra Costa county believes the discovery important, as it accounts for the time lost in which a launch might reasonably be expected to make the trip from Giant to Martinez, and the time when the Pastime arrived there.

HUNDREDS OF FANATICS DIE

Religious Celebrants in the Ganges Are Overwhelmed by Overflow—Worshippers Were Camped on River Bank When Drowned.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Hundreds of religious celebrants at Agra, India, were drowned by an overflow of the river Ganges, according to dispatch to Reuters today. The worshippers were camped near the river bank when the water suddenly rose in the form of tidal wave and overwhelmed hundreds.

APPLE HARVEST ON IN EARNEST

Scarcity of Shooks Has Delayed Game Somewhat But Several Cars of Boxes Are On the Way—Prices Received Are Good.

Spitzenberg and Yellow Newtown apples are being picked in all the orchards of the valley. A scarcity of shooks has delayed the packing of the fruit, but this will end with today as the association has several cars of box lumber ordered, one carload of which arrived in Medford Friday.

Carloads of apples are leaving Medford at the rate of two cars a day. Only two or three of the cars have reached their destination, however, so little is known as to the prices. Secretary Miller, of the association, however, states that there is a heavy demand for Rogue River apples and that good prices will be received. The orders received for Spitzenbergs and other red apples are more numerous than those for the yellow apples. If favorable prices are not offered in early sales, the fruit of the association will be held and held until the market opens up later in the year.

HAWLEY BEAT MULKEY 2094 IN PRIMARIES

Benson Leads Wingate 13,414 votes—Opponent Carries Only One County—Hoyt Beaten for State Treasurer by 3556 Votes

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 7.—Official returns of the recent state-wide primary from all counties save Morrow and Harney today give Jay Bowerman, republican gubernatorial nominee, a plurality of 2934 over his nearest opponent, Grant Dimick.

Bowerman received a total of 16,735 votes, Grant Dimick 13,751, E. Hofer 6665 and Alebt. Abraham 6184.

On the democratic ticket Oswald West is shown to have a majority of 2740 over Jefferson Meyers for the gubernatorial nomination, the totals standing: West, 6693; Meyers, 3953.

From Harney county the returns are complete with the exception of the figures of nine precincts, the total vote in which will not aggregate more than 50. Morrow county is complete but for one small precinct polling half a dozen votes.

In the second congressional district A. W. Lafferty's plurality is 2576 and his total vote 9902. The vote cast for Congressman Ellis was 7326, for C. J. Reed 5064 and G. S. Shepherd 3062.

Representative Hawley's majority over B. F. Mulkey in the first district is 2094. Mulkey carried the counties of Curry, Jackson, Polk and Tillamook. He received a total of 7234 to Hawley's 9328. For the nomination for secretary of state F. W. Benson has a majority of 13,414. G. Wingate carried only his home county of Clatsop, where his vote was nearly double that given Benson. The vote stands: Benson 28,075, Wingate 14,661.

R. W. Hoyt is beaten for the nomination for state treasurer by 3556. Thomas B. Kay carried all the counties but Clatsop, Grant, Malheur, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Wasco and Wheeler. The vote was: Kay 23,975, Hoyt 19,519.

FOREST FIRES CLAIM LIVES

Five Towns Wiped Out in Minnesota—Fires Have Been Raging for Several Weeks and High Winds Give Them Added Fury.

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 7.—A school teacher and a child at Williams are reported dead, three persons are missing and the towns of Swift, Williams, Cedar Springs, Pitt and Graceton are destroyed as a result of forest fires in Minnesota, according to dispatches reaching here. All the towns burned are located along the Canadian Northern rail way.

The fires have been burning for several weeks and, owing to the high wind that has prevailed recently, firefighters have been unable to bring the fires under control. Most of the fires are in logged-off timber lands, so the loss outside of the towns will not be heavy.

The three persons reported missing were residents of Graceton. NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Because Evelyn Thaw, wife of Harry K. Thaw, is without funds to prosecute her suit against James B. Roagan of the Knickerbocker hotel for \$50,000 damages, the action has been dismissed.
