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DRY FARMERS THROUGH TODAY

Many Helpful Informal Talks and Discussions Held During Session—Meeting Place for Next Year to Be Chosen.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. —This afternoon's session probably will be the last of the fifth annual dry farming congress as an attempt will be made to close the business before the convention without resorting to an evening sitting. This is all the more possible as there has been several disappointments, speakers scheduled to address the congress unfortunately finding it impossible to attend.

After the conclusion of the addresses, the reports of the executive committee will be considered and the place of meeting for the next congress formally settled upon.

A feature of the congress has been the daily sessions of the institute at which informal talks and discussions have taken place relative to the details of farming—the putting of theory into practice, and the modifications arising therefrom. Prof. W. G. Shaw of the University of California was one of the principal speakers of the Wednesday evening session. His topic was "Humus as a Vital Factor in Dry Farming."

The paper of Thomas P. Cooper of the Minnesota Agricultural college on "farm management" was another feature which held the attention of the delegates closely.

Among other speakers were Dr. J. M. Hamilton, president of the Montana Agricultural college, and John S. Cole of the United States department of agriculture.
