RUTH SPEAKS ON PROHIBITION

President of Washington Senate Claims Prohibition Does Not Prohibit and Has a Fifty Year Record of Failure in New England States.

Senator A. S. Ruth of Washington addressed a good sized audience at the Medford theater last evening on the home rule for Oregon cities bill. The Washington senator handled the subject in an able and forceful manner, devoting the greater portion of his argument to prohibition and its record. The speaker fortified his argument by a startling array of statistics, showing a marked increase in the government licenses wherever prohibitory laws have been enacted. Quotations from prominent clergymen, statesmen, political economists and editorials from leading magazines, including the Ladies' Home Journal, made up a strong indictment against prohibition.

Mr. Ruth charged that prohibition does not prohibit; that it increases the consumption of the heavier or spirituous liquors and decreases only the lighter, or malt and vinous beverages; that it drives the business underground where it cannot be regulated and where the immature in years find ready access to its use; that it makes hypocrites, perjurers and liars and promotes a disregard of law; that it increases taxation and puts in office a lickspittle, hypocritical, pandering type of politician. These statements were supported largely by the record of the New England states, where he stated prohibition has a fifty year record of failure and final repeal.
