CITY NOTICES.

ORDINANCE NO. 382.

An ordinance providing for the construction of a 12-inch storm sewer along Grape street from Sixth street to the north line of alley between Seventh and Eighth street, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on the property directly benefited therefor.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a 12-inch storm sewer to be constructed along Grape street from Sixth street to the north line of alley between Seventh and Eighth streets, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof, at a meeting of the council to be held October 4, 1910, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., in the council chambers in said city, and all property owners of property adjacent to said sewer and benefited thereby are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place, and show cause, if any they have, why said construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

Section 3. The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by causing three copies of this ordinance to be posted in three public places in said city, and said ordinance to be published once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in the city, at least ten days before the date of said meeting.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, on the 20th day of September, 1910, by the following vote: Welch aye, Merrick aye, Emerick aye, Wortman aye, Elbert aye, Demmer aye.

ASK FOR ASIATIC LABOR; REFUSED

Grand Trunk Pacific railroad Asks for Permit to Use Asiatic Labor But Government Turns Down Application as Inconsistent.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 11.—An application of unusual significance came before yesterday's sitting of Premier McBride, being made by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad company to permit of the employment of Asiatic labor on the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific through British Columbia. The application was accompanied by a newspaper clipping which told of the alleged scarcity of labor in this province and its interference with the natural and desirable progress of construction activity.

After careful consideration, the government decided to refuse the application.

ANOTHER SUSPECT IS HELD IN TUCSON

TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 11.—Alex Collie, who the police say answers closely the description of the man who gave the name of J. B. Bryson when he obtained the dynamite from the Giant Powder company at Giant, Cal., is being held here pending the arrival of an officer from Los Angeles. Collie was arrested upon receipt of advices from Los Angeles. He arrived here the night after the explosion that wrecked the Times building. According to the officers who examined him, he is familiar with dynamite. He talked freely of the Times disaster.

Portland, Oct. 11.—Unmasked, three men walked into the Commerce buffet on Stark street shortly before midnight and at the point of revolvers robbed the saloon and three patrons and escaped. The trio secured several hundred dollars in money and valuables. The descriptions of the highwaymen as given by their victims varied so much that the police are practically without a clue to trace the robbers.
