

CARDINAL SAYS CATHOLICISM IS OUR SALVATION

Primate of Ireland Upholds Aims and Purposes of Catholic Church. Says in that in its Teachings Lies America's Salvation.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Cardinal Logue, Catholic primate of Ireland, in a statement today upheld the aims and purposes of the Roman Catholicism by declaring that the Catholic church, because of its fundamental teachings, is to be America's salvation.

"Because its cardinal principles are more vitally Christian than those of other creeds," said Cardinal Logue "Catholicism will be America's salvation. The church strikes at the very root of things tending to bring about national decay."

Cardinal Logue indicated what he believed to be America's besetting sins, and among these he included divorce and graft by public officials. "Against such evil influences," said the cardinal, "the Catholic church has always waged implacable warfare. Catholicism represents an application of the deepest Christian principles."

Cardinal sounded a note of warning for Portugal.

"Portugal should take France's lesson to heart," said the cardinal. "The warfare on the Catholic church in Portugal is merely an attempt to steal church property on which the state has absolutely no claim. The confiscation of such property results in the funds going into the pockets of public officials instead of the coffers of the state."

"I believe the time is coming when America will be classed as a Catholic nation. Everywhere I see evidences of the tremendous growth of church influence and growth in membership. Only narrow-minded people regard such growth as a menace."

300,000 EMPLOYEES OF FRENCH ROAD MAY GO ON SYMPATHETIC STRIKE

Empty Trains Stand Idle on Tracks Patrolled by Troops—No Violence Yet Attempted—Asked Increase in Wages from 60 Cents to \$1.00 a Day.

PARIS, Oct. 11.—Rioting on the Northern railway lines began today, although no attempts were made by the railway officials to operate the trains.

The workmen who struck suddenly last night gathered about the stations early today and resented the efforts of the troops to disperse them. Bricks were hurled and windows smashed. Little knots of workmen gathered and listened to the excited harangues from fellow workers and socialistic leaders. When these groups grew to large proportions the troops, who are guarding the railway property, crowded around them and ordered them to move on. The troops had orders to keep all unemployed persons moving, but were instructed to use force only when necessary.

PARIS, Oct. 11.—Employees numbering 300,000 men and women of the Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean and the state railroads are today considering a strike in sympathy with the walk out of the northern lines, and the labor situation has reached a critical stage.

All attempts to resume traffic on the northern roads have proved to be fruitless. Empty trains stand useless on the tracks. Soldiers are guarding the railroad property, but as yet no violence has been attempted. Foot soldiers are housed in the empty stations and mounted men are patrolling the tracks.

The strike on the northern line was precipitated by the demand of the coal handlers for an increase in wages of from 60 cents to \$1.00 per day.

When these demands were refused all employees, including women ticket sellers, and even women crossing tenders walked out.

The northern road operates about 3,700 kilometers of track. The Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean operates about 9,000 kilometers and employs 81,000 persons.

JOSEPHINE TO VOTE ON LIQUOR

Wet and Dry Question to Be Threshed Out in November—Wets File a Petition With 360 Names Asking for Another Election

GANTS PASS, Oct. 11.—Josephine county is to go through the throes of another wet and dry campaign this fall. At the last session of the county court the matter of submitting the question came before Greater Oregon Home Rule association the court on the petition of the Greater Oregon Home Rule association.

Judge Jewell and SCounty Clerk S. F. Cheshire went over the petition carefully and checked over the names and it was found that the petition had 360 legal voters' names signed to it.

The county court thereupon ordered that the question be placed upon the ballot and designated the day of the general election, November 8, as the day for voting upon the question of whether the county shall remain dry or wet.

Rescuers, after penetrating two miles from the entrance, found the ventilator which had been demolished by the explosion. The huge motor had been hurled fifty feet from the car on which it was mounted. The rescuers are using a portable fan.

District Superintendent Thompson of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company declared today that the explosion was a freakish one. The force of the explosion was downward, like dynamite, it is said. It spent its force inward, not outward and therefore made it impossible that any of the miners entombed could survive.

Robert Leonard Deceased.

After prolonged illness, due to heart trouble and complications, Robert Leonard, passed away in his 66th year. Mr. Leonard has re-

sided in Ashland for twenty years or more and was well known, says the Tidings.

The funeral services were held from Stock's undertaking parlors, last Saturday afternoon, conducted by Rev. McHenry. A quartet composed of Messrs. Lager and Brown, and the Misses Abbot and Lager, rendered appropriate selections. Interment was in Mountain View cemetery. The deceased leaves a wife and a young daughter.

Mr. Leonard was a native of New York, and has been a resident of the coast section for many years. In business circles he was familiarly known as a hotel solicitor and for a long time pursued that avocation at the depot here in behalf of the public houses in the leading terminal. Politically he was an uncompromising democrat and prided himself on having been aligned as an original Tam-

man organization, while since coming to the coast his political affiliations have been well known not only in county but also in state councils. About a year ago he became identified with the Savoy rooming house of this city but ill health has kept him a good share of the time from actively participating in its management.
