PROHIBITION IN OKLAHOMA

Plain Truth Told in Press Dispatches
—Large Quantities of Liquor Is
Shipped In But No Revenue De-
rived Therefrom.

(Alfalfa County News.)

ELK CITY, OKLA., Oct. 5.—Elk City is the largest town in Beckham county. From January 10 to December 13, 1909, the following shipments were received in this city over the Rock Island railroad.

169 barrels of whiskey.
482 cases of whiskey.
1,033 barrels of beer.
14 cases of beer.

This does not include the large amount of liquor shipped by way of express, nor does it include liquors shipped to any other point in the county.

If it is liquor to be sold in Oklahoma, then Oklahoma should receive the revenue from that sale.

Under the law initiated by the people, and to be voted on by them November 8, 1910, the county road and bridge fund receives one thousand dollars and one thousand dollars is to go to the local community for public improvements.

TOO EXPENSIVE.

Commissioners Abandon Efforts to Enforce Prohibition Law

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Oct. 5.—Admitting that the cost of attempting to enforce the prohibitory law in Muskogee county had cost that county approximately \$100,000 and added materially to the burden of taxation, the county commissioners decided as long ago as July that they would spend no more of the people's money in a futile effort to enforce the law. The county now has a deficit from this source alone of \$35,000 and it is expected that a bond issue will be necessary to meet this indebtedness.

Local option and high license for Muskogee would settle this question in a satisfactory manner, give to the county probably \$35,000 a year to build good roads and bridges, and regulate the liquor traffic in liquor in such a manner as to remove the debauching effect.

UNDER LICENSE the farmer and his son must go to the saloon to get liquor. Under the prohibition the saloon (the bootlegger) goes to them.
