IN FAVOR OF STATE NORMAL

Von der Hellen's Record Shows Him Friendly to Ashland Normal—Voted and Worker for School When in Legislature.

WELLEN, Ore., Oct. 19.—To the Editor—Dear Sir: Will you oblige me by publishing an emphatic denial of the report, which seems to be abroad, alleging that I am not favorable to the measure for the maintenance of the T. O. State Normal school at Ashland, about to be submitted for the vote of the people at our coming election. I can fortunately refer to my previous record to prove my position towards the school, when serving as representative for Jackson County during the session of the legislature of 1905, at which time I worked for the liberal appropriation then obtained. And again during the session of 1907, when adverse legislation was threatened, as a private citizen I traveled to Salem along with other public spirited citizens of Ashland and Jackson counties to work for the interest of our Normal school.

May add that, during my present canvass of the county I find the sentiment of the people so largely in favor of the proposed bill for permanent maintenance of the school that I have no doubt whatever of an all but unanimous vote in favor of the measure. Respectfully,
